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EDGAR NEW CHAMPION IN UNCANNY PLAY

Hamilton (Ont.), July 30.—Playing one of the most sensational games ever witnessed on a Canadian or American link, Douglas Edgar, an English professional, representing the Draid Hill Gold Club, of Atlanta (Ga.), former French open champion, won the Canadian open championship here this afternoon, concluding the two day tournament, with the record of 278 for the 72 holes, and was fifteen strokes ahead of James Barnes, St. Louis, "Bobby" Jones, Atlanta (Ga.), and Earl Keffer, Ottawa, the Canadian all of whom were tied for second position with a score of 293 which was tied last week by Barnes at Cleveland, by five shots. He was cheered by a large gallery when he finished the last round, 18 holes in 66, which was three below the course record.

Edgar seemed like a well-oiled machine, and his beautiful play fascinated the gallery. His terrific tee shots ored of the uncanny, and his putting was superb. That Keffer should have lost his championship in such a match was no disgrace, for Edgar was unbeatable. He was presented with the prize of \$200 and a gold medal.

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SAY THAT MEET MAY NOT BE HELD AT MOOSPATH PARK

Report From Fredericton Would Indicate That Races May Be Transferred There

(Fredericton Gleaner.)
The maritime circuit race meeting that was announced for St. John next week may not be held at Moospath Park, but may be transferred to Fredericton.

For some time the Fredericton Park Association have been seeking date for August for races here and it looks as if the opportunity was here, provided the conditions are agreeable. If, on the other hand, the association are unwilling to handle the meetings, it is said that local men stand ready to lease the track and put on races here next week.

Moospath Park is said to be under control of George Lawson, a contractor of St. John, who has been staging an almost startling "come back" with Barton A. 2:04 1-4, famous as king of the ice tracks of the New England States for some years, and Baron A. figures very prominently in the reasons as to why St. John will not have its circuit meeting.

The explanation of the difficulty at St. John is said to be disputes which occurred at the meeting at Sackville last week when Mr. Lawson claims that Barton A. was deprived of first money in his race. He is said to have declared that he was "framed" and to have stated that in retaliation he would keep Moospath Park gates closed and not allow any racing to take place over the track.

In connection with the reports regarding the St. John meeting it is significant that entry blanks for the meeting have not yet appeared, although the races are scheduled for next week; it will therefore be necessary for whoever eventually takes the dates to hurry their arrangements along if good fields are to be secured and the meeting is to be properly advertised.

The Maritime Circuit of 1919 will be remembered as having had a stormy path; but, if the sport is only kept clean during the balance of this season and a proper organization with the right kind of officials secured in proper time, harness racing should have its banner season in 1920.—J. D. B.

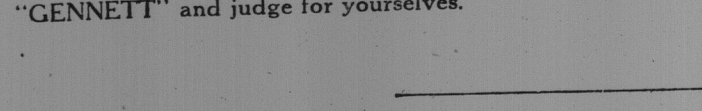
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
