Austin Chamberlain has decided to resign his seat in the English parliament to seek re-election in his father's constituency of Birmingham.

Telephonic communication between Charlottetown and Halifax was inaugurated last night when Premier Matheson from the island conversed for about ten minutes with Sir Robert Borden in Halifax.

Frank Keays of Millstream, was killed last night on the I. C. R. near Metegville, when he was run over by a train while riding a trolley car. He was twenty-three years old and unmarried.

The firm of Lipton's Limited was formally declared yesterday in the House of Lords, to be barred from taking any future contracts for English army supplies because of the disclosures made in recent bribery cases.

Rev. Dr. T. W. Herridge, new moderator of the Presbyterian General Assembly, was yesterday given a year's leave of absence by his Ottawa congregation to devote the time to his new office.

WELL PRESENT THE
BLINDNESS OF VIRTUE

Strong Play at Opera House Makes a Favorable Impression On Audience

Cosmo Hamilton's famous work, The Blindness of Virtue, was presented in an excellent manner to a fair sized audience in the Opera House last evening by the William Morris Company of players from the Little Theatre, London.

Although the production is virtually a problem play, it was handled in a very clear yet unoffending manner, and brought home the moral which its title suggests.

The play hinges around the activities of the vicar, Harry Pemberton, the vicar of East Brenton who, through the experiences of some of the members of his flock, comes to the conclusion that his daughter Edie is innocently ignorant of the great problem of life. Through the persuasions of his wife, however, he refrains from imparting to her the knowledge that he considers should be hers and the situation of the play is set.

The play is a very exacting role, which calls for some strong acting. The strength of character and goodness of the vicar and the loving solicitude of the father were brought out to perfection and won general praise from the audience.

Miss Gladys Hopetown, in the part of Mrs. Helen Pemberton, the vicar's wife, does not figure prominently in the piece with the exception of one scene, in which she is persuaded by her husband, much against her own will, to look more seriously on her daughter's ignorance.

Miss Hopetown has a splendid stage appearance and the assigned role in the play was very well carried out.

The vicar's daughter, Edie, around whom the drama is built, fulfilled the part of the innocent girl and assisted materially in the success of the piece.

A. Hamilton Gibbs, as the vicar, Mr. Graham, the girl's admirer, and Marjorie Stiles, as Mary Ann, a village girl, completes the serious end of the cast, while, in the role of Cooke, the maid, Miss Marie Ault furnished sufficient humor to lighten the production.

The play as a whole is very interesting and the players are deserving of much praise for the manner in which it was enacted. The Blindness of Virtue will be repeated tonight and tomorrow afternoon and evening.
