Labor Man in Australia Works His Way to Position of Importance

Melbourne, Jan. 19.—The wonders of labor rule in the parliament of Australia are in evidence. The South Australian legislative assembly has just elected as its presiding officer a man of thirty-five, surely the youngest speaker in the world. Mr. Jackson had acted as deputy-speaker during the illness of Sir John Cope, the retiring speaker, and won his elevation on his death.

He was educated at Croydon, England, and spent the first seventeen years of his life in and around London. He was educated in the Croydon National School, and came to South Australia in 1886 with a brain teeming with ideas and with the desire to escape from the ancient prejudices of his motherland. As a youth he became associated with mining and general trade unionism, and took a leading part as one of the organizers of the forward movement in the strike labor party. He began public life as a member of the Port-Pine town council. Four years ago he was returned as one of the labor members for Stanley, and in 1910, on the accession of the Verdon government to power, he was appointed chairman of committees. For a very successful young man Mr. Jackson is modest in speech and deportment.

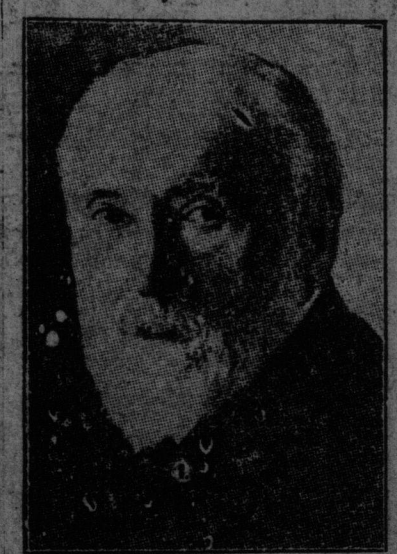

INTERESTS HAVE THE GRIP AT OTTAWA

Government's "Do Nothing" Policy About Trusts—Courtney Bay

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—The refusal of the federal government to introduce legislation for the regulation of trusts and combines was an interesting feature of yesterday's session of the house. Liberal members drew attention to the existing abuses and asked for a remedy, and were told that the government would consider the matter but would not introduce legislation at this session.

Hon. Mr. Oliver asked for action with regard to the broad combine and Mr. Knowles made a query respecting the existence of a combine to regulate retail lumber prices in the prairie provinces. Their inability to secure satisfactory answers drew forth some very sharp criticism of the government's policy of doing nothing but merely thinking.

Mr. Buchanan of Lethbridge urged the appointment of a permanent board of consultation under the lieutenant-governor to keep the weakness of the present system when two of the members are partisans and the third member is frequently uninformal.

Western Liberals drew attention to Hon. Mr. Roger's telegram saying he had sold the coat of arms in Alberta several weeks before the dispute was brought to an end.

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—Because he failed to discipline the waggoner on the locomotive who interrupted Arnold Lavigne's speech by shouting "Laurier's a liar," Sir Wilfrid Laurier's meeting at Quebec last September by booting the whistle of his locomotive superintendent, W. A. Dube of the Montreal-St. Lawrence division of the International has been dismissed by the minister of railways.

Ottawa, Jan. 19.—The \$1,000,000 which is in the estimates for St. John harbor will probably be split into three parts: for west side dredging, for the Connolly wharf, and for the Courtney Bay. The Courtney Bay contract has not yet been signed, but will probably be signed shortly.
