In war we shall find both honor and safety in a happy neutrality which permits our forces to maintain a glory-inactively while our flag is fired upon."

The first instance, of course, Sir Wilfrid has never said anything so utterly untrue. The manifest absurdity of any statement gloriously inactive while the flag is being fired upon needs no comment. It is not only absurd but needs to be right in any case which justifies her? Was there any backwardness on the part of Canada in taking up the African campaign in which they were material? SIR JOHN THOMPSON
APPEALED TO PEOPLE
FOR RECIPROCITY VOTE

Tories May Here Read of Another
Chiefdom Who Supported
Trade Pact With States

(Victoria Times.)
Perhaps Mr. Borden will remember a Canadian statesman named Sir John Thompson. It will be conceded that Sir John was, next to Sir John A. Macdonald, the most brilliant Conservative statesman that Canada has known since Confederation. In the year 1881—just at the time that Sir Oliver Mowat and the others whom Mr. Borden quotes as saying things which he quotes—Sir John Thompson issued an address to the electors of Antigonish, for which constituency he was the federal candidate. We publish this address in full, as it contains a few references to the reciprocity question which it is inadvisable for Conservatives to forget.

To the Electors of the County of Antigonish:
"Gentlemen,—At the election which will take place on the 21st day of March, I will be a candidate for re-election as a member of the House of Commons for the County of Antigonish.
"The government of which I am a member, is appealing to the country with a policy which we believe will be heartily endorsed by a great majority of the electors. We have made to the government of the United States, through the government of Great Britain, proposals for reciprocity in trade, which we have good reason to believe will result in an arrangement by which the markets of the United States will be re-opened to the products which our people desire most to send there.
"A fair measure of reciprocity is what we desire, and we have no doubt that that can be obtained without undue sacrifices. I respectfully ask your support and votes, and I pledge myself to serve the best interests of the country, if I should be honored by a renewal of the confidence which was reposed in me at the two last elections and for which I shall be forever grateful."

It may be noted that Sir John Thompson afterward became Canada's premier, and so far as is known he never departed from the views he held at the time he issued the address. The political situation in Canada or the United States has not changed to make absorption more likely or reciprocity less desirable.
