

Amherst, N. S., Feb. 6.—Owing to a snow blow-in at Nappan, five miles east of Amherst, main line traffic on the C. N. R. suffered another tie-up this morning. Number 10, St. John to Halifax express, due to leave Amherst at 8:55 a.m., did not get away until 10:40. The local train from Springhill to Moncton was held at Springhill for three hours. A freight caught in the snow at Nappan Bridge and unable to push its way through, was brought to Nappan in seven sections, two locomotives from the Amherst yards being used.

## INCENDIARISM IN IRELAND

### Senator Resigns Under the Threat That His House Would be Burned.

Dublin, Feb. 6.—There were several cases of incendiarism reported on Sunday night. The residence of Sheriff Russell, near Dundalk, and that of Colonel Maude, at Tinodi, Wicklow, were destroyed under the usual circumstances. The families were turned out of their beds into the yards and held under guns until the destruction of the houses had been accomplished. Dr. George Sigerson, member of the Free State senate, resigned his seat yesterday. He had received a threat that his house would be burned. He did not care for himself personally, he said, but he must have regard for his family and their property.

Washington, Feb. 6.—Exclusion of Japanese immigrants and a reduction in the percentage of aliens admissible to the U. S. from European countries, would be provided for by sections of a proposed permanent immigration restriction act approved yesterday by the House immigration committee. Completion of the entire measure within a day or two and a prompt report to the House is the committee's plan.

### SLAIN COBBLER'S \$50,000 ESTATE SURPRISES KIN

New York, Feb. 6.—Investigation of the affairs of Thomas Mastradota, a shoemaker whose throat was cut Sunday night in his shop at 17th street and Atlantic avenue, Morris Park, Queens, caused surprise among his relatives.

It was found that the cobbler had left an estate of \$50,000 or more. Deeds to property valued at \$40,000 were among the effects found in the little room back of his shop, in which he lived with his nephew, Tony Mastradota.

William A. McLaughlin, the attorney retained by the shoemaker's relatives, was surprised also. He was surprised to discover that Tony Mastradota was named as executor in the dead man's will. The surprising part of that is that Tony is under arrest charged with killing his uncle. Tony and several of his brothers are heirs to the estate. According to the prisoner he got into a fight with his uncle when the latter refused to return \$200 he had borrowed.

New York, Feb. 6.—Investigation of the Anti-Saloon League by a legislative committee is asked in a resolution introduced in the legislature night night by Assemblyman Louis A. It asks that the judiciary committee of the assembly investigate the financial affairs of the league, especially the nature of its disbursements and the sources of its revenue and to determine whether the organization is maintained for political purposes.

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**POPE URGES FAITHFUL TO PRAY FOR PEACE IN WORLD**

**Rome, Feb. 6.—Pope Pius in a letter to Cardinal Pompili, vicar of Rome, expresses anxiety over the present international situation which he believes threatens "fresh sorrow, pain and anxiety for humanity."**

**He requests Cardinal Pompili to urge the faithful to "beseech God to save humanity from fresh tribulations and lead the peoples and governments back to feelings of fraternity and equity."**

**DEATH OF CARDINAL**  
London, Feb. 6.—Cardinal Giuseppe Prisco, Archbishop of Naples, is dead, says a Central News despatch from Rome.

**Cardinal Prisco was born at Roccaraso, in the diocese of Naples, on September 8, 1839. He was created a cardinal on November 30, 1890 and was made Archbishop of Naples on March 24, 1898.**

### THROWS BOY'S BODY IN FRONT OF HOME

Father is Called Out as the Corpse of His Son is Pushed from an Automobile.

Oklahoma City, Feb. 6.—Police are searching for an unidentified man who drove an automobile up to the curb in front of the home of J. A. Horner here and threw the body of his son, Revere, twenty-four years old, on the sidewalk, after summoning the father from his car. The car then sped away.

Horner told the police he was aroused by a knock on the front door. When he answered, a voice from the automobile said:

"I've got your son here."

"Send him in here, I want to talk to him," Horner replied.

"I can't," the man in the car rejoined, and pushed the body to the sidewalk.

"I've had him in here since Sunday," the visitor added, as he drove away.

Horner said the boy had been in St. Joseph, Mo., about a year, and police expressed the belief that the body had been brought here overland.

Young Horner had been shot once through the stomach and probably had lived some time after. There were no other marks of violence.

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



