

TELEGRAPH NEWS.

LONDON, June 5. In the House of Commons this evening an amendment to the suspending bill offered, placing the office tenures under the Maynooth College grant, on the same basis as livings in the Irish Church.

The amendment was opposed as destructive and not suspensory in accordance with the character of the bill under consideration, and was rejected by the House. The House then voted in favor of permitting new appointments to be made to Maynooth College, and also in favor of the continuance of the regium donum during the pleasure of Parliament.

The suspensory bill was then passed in committee.

The announcement of the result was received with cheers.

The Emperor of Austria asserts he had to make his choice of two alternatives with regard to the recent laws hostile concordat. To sign them or abdicate, and he chose the former. This explanation is intended to soften the resentment for his violation of the concordat.

Ottawa, June 5. Authentic information has been received here of the transfer of large quantities of Fenian arms and ammunition from St. Albans to points along the frontier.

Mr. Row, Minister of Finance, leaves here the 10th inst., for England on Government business.

The orders for the transfer of three Companies from Quebec to Ottawa have been countermanded.

New York, June 5. Money quiet at 3 a 5 per cent on call.

Gold closed dull at 140.

Washington, June 6th. It is said that the British Minister has addressed a letter to the Secretary of State, calling attention to the fact that the Canadian Government admits American coal free of duty, which has been done in hopes that the American Government would sanction some reciprocal legislation; and asking whether this Government is prepared to consider the question. The matter having been referred to the Secretary of the Treasury, it is said he replied that Congress having abrogated the old Reciprocity Treaty, he did not consider it proper that the Executive should re-open the question unless Congress should give some indications of its desire to do so. The papers are before the Committee of Ways and Means.

New York, 6th. Despatches from Montreal report continued auxiliary activity against feared invasion of Fenians.

Gold quiet and steady.

London, June 7. Despatches dated May 30th, from Napier, states that he hoped to reach the coast of the Red Sea at Zoula by the first of June.

He parted company with Kassai, his native ally, the day before.

The Pope has sent an agent to the United States to enlist troops there for the Papal army.

General Garibaldi has written several very earnest letters to his friends and to the authorities in America entreating them in behalf of the liberal party of Italy, to discourage the project.

Brussels, June 7th. Le Nord asserts that the opinion widely prevalent in Paris that war will break out in Europe before the close of autumn.

Vienna, June 7th. Prince Napoleon has arrived from Baden. He was received by the Emperor Francis Joseph, with whom he had a close consultation.

The object of the Prince's mission is unknown.

The Chamber of deputies, the Lower House of the Reichsrath, have voted to fund all the different forms of national indebtedness with the exception of lottery obligations placing the rate of interest at five per cent per annum, and imposing a heavy tax on coupons.

New York, June 8th. Gold 139 1/2.

Berlin, June 6. Bismarck urges an adoption by the nations of Europe and America of Treaties establishing uniform international system for measurement of tonnage and capacity of shipping. He proposes the English method of measurement as the best basis for such a system, but suggests that it be modified by the association of the Metric principle. The North German Confederation is prepared to open negotiations with Foreign Governments on this question.

St. Petersburg, June 7. The Emperor of Russia has issued a ukaz setting free all natives persons of foreign birth now exiled to Siberia and all natives of Russian Poland who are sentenced to less than 20 years exile.

London, June 8. Chief Justice Cockburn states that the charge delivered by Judge Blackburn to the Grand Jury recently refused to bring in a bill of indictment against Ex-Governor Eyre, of Jamaica, is contrary to the opinion of the majority of Court of Queen's Bench.

The annual Conference of the Wesleyan Methodist Church of the Province commenced its sittings to-day. There are about six hundred delegates present. The morning was spent in routine business. It is forty four years since the Canadian Conference was established. The first meeting was held in 1824, and at the time there was only thirty six clergymen of the denomination in the province, and a membership of about six thousand. Now the ministers number five hundred and thirty and the members nearly sixty thousand. The Conference will this year be marked by the presence of the Rev. W. Morley Poulton

and other eminent clergymen from a distance. [Toronto paper.]

In regard to the emigration from these Provinces to the West, the Toronto Globe, says:—

The same thing occurs, and has occurred for many years in the New England States. The young men of the older settlements on this continent, whether these settlements are British or American, have many temptations to seek their homes and seek their fortunes in the newer country of the West. The lesson which should teach us is, the importance of providing as speedily as possible a "Great West" within the Dominion to receive those of our people who want to seek their fortunes in the West.

From the leading article in the "University Monthly," we copy the following apposite remarks, which will be endorsed by nine tenths of the educated classes. The writer has considerably plucked to speak so plainly of the educational course pursued in his alma mater:—

"Every day strengthens us in the opinion that in the course of an educational training too little time is given to the study and investigation of our own English language, and that the study of the classic Greek and Latin claims far too large a proportion of our toil and labor. True, that in all institutions of learning, these have for centuries been considered indispensable to a liberal mental training, and unless one is fairly conversant with the standard masterpieces of these tongues his pretensions to anything like a thorough education are gravely questioned; but equally true is it that a knowledge of these may be made an unreasonable standard of judging, and that many who exhibit a laudable proficiency in classical literature may still be sadly deficient in all that goes to constitute a really valuable stock of knowledge. 'Tis surely of little credit to a man to be well acquainted with every myth and legend of the olden time, and yet discover a lamentable ignorance with regard to the most striking events of modern history, which in its practical bearing on the present and future is of infinite importance to us. Yet fully one-fourth of a student's time is taken up in poring over tough Greek and obscure Latin, while a hurried glance at 'Pincock's Goldsmith' or 'Hume abridged' constitutes his whole stock of modern history."

On the first page we have copied from the St. John Globe a letter over the signature of "Fair Play," which corroborates our remarks with reference to the advisability of appointing Colonel Anderson District Commander of the Militia of New Brunswick.

The Colonel's services would be invaluable at the present juncture, and the appointment would be as judicious as it would be popular.

THE PARISH SCHOOL is to be opened to-day. Mr. D. B. White, graduate of Edinburgh University who has been engaged in teaching for a few years, has undertaken the duties of Master of the School; and if his reputed ability as an instructor of youth is a guarantee of success, then the parents of his scholars will not regret the school having been closed for the last five months. Mr. White comes recommended as a person capable and willing to impart instruction, and a strictly temperate man. We are also informed that he is prepared to teach the classics in addition to the usual English branches.

A Fenian Convention is to be held in Portland on Tuesday the 16th inst. The "Star" among other things adds:—

President John C. White, Gen. S. P. Spear, Secretary of War, and other distinguished Fenians will be present. The Fenians of this city are at work in earnest in the way of drilling and fitting out for the field, which it is said they will soon take; this being the last convention which is to be held preparatory to a move.

A HARD HIT—A committee of the Massachusetts Legislature appointed to inquire into the practice of employing children in the Mills, conclude their report with the following recommendation:—"That men be employed forthwith to go to India, to collect the jewels from the noses of Burmese women, that the same may be converted into money to be used for the purpose of converting the heathen of New England." The report says—the children are overworked and die before they reach their 18th year. Shades of the Pilgrims revert these heathens!

DEATH OF THE REV. DR. HENDERSON.—A despatch to the Rev. Peter Keay, conveys the melancholy intelligence of the death of this venerable and much beloved clergyman. It occurred at his residence at Newcastle, on Saturday, at half past nine o'clock, p. m.

Our contemporary of the "St. Croix Courier," has recently been on a tour to Canada and the Western States, and furnished his journal with interesting letters of travel. These letters with his concluding observations are well worth perusal, and give sketches of the coun-

try through which he travelled. We are happy to learn that he has recruited his health, and has donned the editorial harness with renewed vigor. He says "Canada upon the whole is a country of which we may well feel proud."

The Publishers of this Province should meet and arrange a scale of prices for advertising, &c., from which there should be no departure. Topley, the English pedestrian, walked 7 miles and a half in fifty-six minutes and ten seconds, on the Bloomingdale road, New York last week, and thereby won his \$500, having nearly four minutes to spare of the hour.

The Customs Department has been removed to Stevenson's new building, Water Street, which has been finished for the purpose, with an examining warehouse in the back part of the building.

The County Court was opened yesterday, His Honor Judge Stevens presiding. Three causes were entered for trial.

ITEMS.

The Library of the University of N. B. has received the highly prized addition, from Her Majesty the Queen, of copies of her recent works, "The early years of His Royal Highness the Prince Consort," and "Leaves from the journal of our lives in the Highlands," each volume containing the Queen's autograph on the fly leaf.

Cars have been recently run over a portion of the European and North American Railway near Bangor.

England spent almost or quite half a million dollars in additions to the British Museum last year.

Most of the disgusted southerners who emigrated to La Plata, South America, are returning, their disgust increased tenfold, and their purses very light.

The fare from Boston to New York by the Stonington line has been reduced to two dollars.

There was a horrible row on the street last night after 11 o'clock. It occurred just above the Braly House, and the parties were left to fight it out by themselves, constables being available just at that time. We have heard that a young man named Ingraham was pretty roughly handled.—[Fredericton Reporter.]

Chemists have reduced nitro-glycerine to a solid. Grenades filled with it, and fired from guns of moderate calibre, it is said will break through the strongest iron clads.

Mrs. Langdon, sister of Wm. B. Astor, has begun a suit against her brother for the recovery of property valued at several millions.

Lowell manufactures 3,268,000 yards of cotton cloth; 19,500 yards of woolen cloth; 35,000 yards carpets; 2,500 shawls; 6,000 dozen hosiery a week.

Mr. Fumston's lecture in Chicago brought \$20,000 to the Young Man's Christian Association.

All parties seem to agree in saying that there never was a more favorable season for fruits than the present. The blossoms are unusually vigorous on both large and small fruits.

Arizona has cactuses fifty feet high and bearing delicious fruit.

Only a mile and a half from the island of St. Croix, West Indies, no bottom is reached at a depth of one thousand fathoms. The people think they live on a great sea mountain.

Major General Doyle has been gazetted to the Colonelscy of the 7th foot.

UNIVERSITY.—The Douglas Gold Medal, or English Essay prize at the University, has been gained this year by Mr. Samuel Russell of Miramichi. Mr. Charles A. Macdonald, of St. John, is the successful competitor for the Alumni Gold Medal. Mr. William Macfarlane, also of St. John, wins the Michosepe presented by ex-Governor Gordon as a prize in Natural Science. Mr. William Pagny of Sussex, takes the Mathematical Scholarship; Mr. Robert Bennett of this city, the Classical, and Mr. J. Curry of Queensbury, that in English Literature. The biennial celebration takes place on Thursday the 26th inst.—[Farmer.]

New York, June 9th. A Japan letter states that stringent orders in reference to attacks on foreigners have been issued, making high officials, so offending, liable to decapitation, and loss of caste, without the honor of a Hari Kari. The Envoy Plenipotentiary of the Mikado to open the entire country to trade and travel.

Advices from Mexico represent the condition of affairs in the interior as very much demoralized. Society is chaotic, and crime and violence everywhere prevalent. Gold opened at 139 1/2.

On Monday last, the lath machine in the Poquik Mills, owned by Mr. Bradbury, owing to some fault of the construction, fell thro' into the boiling stream below, carrying with it in its fall four men who were busy with the mach at the time. Two of them Mr. Manu were killed, the others were saved.

LOST OVERBOARD.—Mr. George Parker and John Laak, of Campobello, Charlotte County, were lost overboard from the barque "Sarah," of Belfast, Ireland, during a severe gale, on her passage from Buenos Ayres.—Parker leaves a wife and child, Laak was unmarried.—[Tel.]

We are glad to learn that Mr. Best in making arrangements to again start the Iron Works at Woodstock. He will get to work in the fall, say October or November. A firm in Boston has contracted for all the iron that can be produced by our furnaces.

Small pox still continues in Montreal.—During the last week in May twelve cases proved fatal. The whole number of burials in that city, produced by various diseases during the week referred to, amounted to 106.

The sum already in bank at Montreal to the credit of "The McGee Testimonial Fund" amounts to about \$3,000. The subscriptions in Quebec city reached nearly \$550.

The weather which was unsettled for the last week, cleared up this morning. The grass looks well, and the grain and root crops are promising.

The Quebec Chronicle concludes an article on Judge Wilnot's probable elevation to the Lieutenant Governor's Throne in the following words: "It has been surmised that the Hon. Mr. Fisher will be appointed to succeed Judge Wilnot on the Bench."

The mint of the United States have coined since they commenced operations (twenty years ago) the large amount of eight hundred million dollars, about one fifth of which amount the currency of the world, of the whole amount \$500,000,000 has been derived from their own mints.
