FIRST EDITION. SEVEN WERE KILLED.

FEARFUL COLLISION ON NEW YORK CENTRAL.

A locomotive crashed into a passenger car on the New York Central depot at 7:30 o'clock, with the result that seven persons were killed and many others injured.

The Buffalo & Niagara Falls special which left the Grand Central depot at 7:30 o'clock, was derailed on the first mile of its journey.

The engine, which was a 4-6-0, was derailed on the first mile of its journey.

In the moment or two he was there the heavy 80-ton engine, thundering by the station, in less than 75 seconds it had covered the distance between the depot and the derailed engine, and was crashing into the last sleeper of the express, the heavy wood and iron work of the car was smashed to bits, and seven passengers were lying dead and many wounded.

Some of the wounded are likely to die, but the majority are not considered dangerous.

THE TRAIN IS ON THE PARADE night train on the Central. Its first regular stop after leaving the Grand Central is Peekskill.

Exactly what caused the train to stop after Hastings tonight is not known.

It is thought that the train was stopped by a signal which was probably a hot box in one of the sleeping cars, and not the smash at the depot, as the train was moving at a high speed.

The engine had no warning whatever of the danger until his engine was within 100 feet or so from the rear of the stalled engine.

No one in the car had time to think before it was all over. There were shrieks and cries from the wounded and dying, and then a momentary silence as the engine came to a stop.

A half hour's groping in the wreckage and some of the injured passengers, who had also recovered, saw, cut away the shell of the telescoped car, and the bodies of two or three of the dead were brought out.

One of the dead was a man, and the other two were women.

The dead bodies were laid out beside the tracks on improvised stretchers. Beds were procured for the injured, and the doctors attended to them.

Behind their coats and broken boxes, they had been frantically scolded by the steam that escaped from the pipes that heated the car.

It was more than an hour before the last of the injured and the dead were taken out then a train was taken up, and with the doctors they were put on board and taken to Yonkers and to Tarrytown.

Of the 18 persons in the car, the Gibraltar, including the conductor and porter, three escaped. They were J. E. Good, a man named Jacobson of 243 West Twenty-third street and a man named Corneo.

The engineer and fireman of the second train were not hurt. The fireman jumped just before the collision.

The other wreck occurred in the tunnel under King Street on the Central Hudson railroad at 8:30 o'clock last night.

The south bound Croton local, due at King Street at 8:30 in charge of Engineer Ellis, crashed into a freight in charge of Conductor Ryan that was backing up from Scarborough.

The engine of the local and a dozen cars of the freight were thrown in all directions, the rubbish filling the tunnel and blocking both tracks.

The passengers of the local received a severe shaking up. The engineer and fireman jumped.

The tracks were cleared in 10 o'clock.

The blame is placed upon the engineer of the freight.
