PETERBORO FIREMEN REFUSE TO ACCEPT THEIR DISCHARGES

The men claim the chief cause of their discharge is their criticism of Chief Grange, they having appeared before the Trades and Labor Council on Wednesday night with a suggestion for an investigation of the fire department.


A charter has been granted to the St. Thomas Labor Council incorporating the St. Thomas Labor Temple Company at \$100,000. The stock in the company will be sold locally at \$1 per share, as in Detroit and other large clites where temples, have been erected. The local company was formed some time ago, with George Richardson as president, and George Gregory as secretary-treasurer.

The new structure will occupy a prominent site which has, it is stated, been already located, and will have on the ground floor a market shed and extensive selling quarters. On the second floor will be the large council chamber and auditorium, and on the top floor the rooms of the various labor organizations in the city. The building will be one of the finest possible. Plans have already been prepared.
