

Boers Had No Time to Take Up a Position to Receive Cavalry.

Over Fifty of the Enemy Killed and Wounded-Plague at Capetown.

London, March 27 .- The war office has received the following dispatch from Lord Kitchener, March 27th:

"Our casualties in Gen. Babington's action were two killed and seven wounded. The Boers left 22 dead and 30 wounded. As their pursuit was rapid, many more Boer casualties are likely. 'The operations of March 23rd drove enemy north from their positions at Kaffir's Kraal. On the 27th the purnit was continued by mounted men only. The enemy's rear guard was driven in by a combined movement on both flanks. Their convoy was then sighted at Len-wooffontein. The Greys, New Zealanders and Bushmen pushed on. The enemy attempted to take up a position, but the Greys and other troops rode down all opposition, and gave them no chance.

"The convoy was ridden into and the nemy's retirement became a rout. The pursuit was continued until the horses were exhausted."
