MANCHESTER LINERS WILL LEAVE ST. JOHN. Summer Service to be Abandoned---Last Boat Till Winter Port Opens---Too Much Business at Philadelphia.

The sailing of the steamer Manchester, Commerce this evening will mark the closing of the regular sailings of the Manchester line from this port until the opening of the winter port season, about the last of November. During the past season the Manchester Corporation and the Manchester Commerce have been making regular trips between Manchester and Philadelphia, with St. John as a port of call. The steamships would bring considerable freight here from Manchester for local merchants and points east and west, and on her outward manifest the cargo averaged about one thousand tons. The cargo consisted chiefly of lumber and pulp and a good quantity went to Philadelphia, the greater portion was taken to Manchester.

BUDAPEST, Sept. 16.—A tragic story of the love affair of a young German nobleman and a lady circus rider has just been brought to light through the attempt of the young lady to commit suicide. Mile Feodor, as she is known, though her real name is Fraulein Weissenbach, while performing in Dusseldorf so charmed a young Baron von Leyden, an officer in the German army, by her beauty and horsemanship, that when the circus left Dusseldorf the baron obtained leave of absence in order to accompany her to Budapest, and there he promised to marry her.

VATICAN CONFINEMENT INJURES POPE'S HEALTH

(Special cable to the Star.) LONDON, Sept. 16.—The Italian correspondent of the "Lancet" writes as follows regarding the health of the Pope:—"Just before the Supreme Pontiff was about to assume a second anniversary of his promotion to the Holy See he had one of those recurrent attacks with which, if not secreted, his ailments, are sufficient to cause a flutter in the ecclesiastical dovecots. There is a rumor that the Pope is confined to the left knee. Dr. Lapponi was called in, and having with local and general treatment included the welcome news that he left his august patient to the seclusion of his private apartments, with his physician's prescriptions which he is to receive at intervals of some forty hours.

SEARCH FOR KELLY PROVES UNAVAILING.

NEW YORK, Sept. 15.—No trace has yet been found of Paul Kelly, motor-man of the "L" train wrecked on Monday morning with a loss of twelve lives. The police have kept up their search, but have been able to obtain no information of his movements since he left the house of a friend in East 134th street soon after the accident. All concerned agree that Kelly was not blame in running past the signals showing that the switches were set for the Fifty-third street curve. Cornelius Jackson, towerman, admittedly had the switches wrong for Kelly's train, whether he was at his post of duty or not.

GENERAL BOOTH'S OFFER.

MONTREAL, Sept. 15.—A London cable says: General Booth has asked Alfred Deakin, Australian premier, by cable, whether he can place in Australia 5,000 families not destitute and who are expected to be available during the coming winter. Interviewed by the Daily Chronicle, regarding the scheme, General Booth said that the Salvation Army was now engaged in reducing emigration to a system by which, on a large scale, able bodied men with their wives and families may be fitted to earn a living in another country. Last year he sent 1,000 to Canada, and only four or five turned out failures. Canada can swallow up people by the thousands, but there are other countries besides Canada open for the purpose.

GREAT FAMINE IN SPAIN; THOUSANDS STARVING. Hardships Unparalleled in Nation's History---40,000 Emaciated Victims Storm Houses of Rich.

(Special cable to the Star.) MADRID, Sept. 16.—The famine in Spain is believed to be the worst in the history of the kingdom. Telegrams are arriving from all parts of Andalusia giving most alarming accounts of the disorders arising from the famine. Great excitement has followed the despatch of the troops to Osona, where anarchy is reported to prevail. The wealthier families are flocking into Seville and Cordova for protection. At Seville, Utrera and Carmona, the prisons are crowded. In spite of the efforts of the police new bands of hungry peasants have forced their way into Malaga.

FORTUNE WON AND LOST.

Stoker Who Won \$150,000 in Lottery Got Drunk and Had it All Stolen From Him Shortly After. (Special cable to the Star.) PARIS, Sept. 16.—A remarkable story which reads like a scene from a play is told along the Boulevard of Paris. While in New York a young German stoker, of twenty, on board a steamer bound for the West Indies bought a one dollar ticket in a lottery for charity, then called for the Antilles. On his return to New York he happened to pick up a paper and found that his ticket had won the big prize of \$150,000. No more stoking for him; he shook the coal dust of the engine room from his feet forever, went to the bank, put in his precious ticket, received a draft for \$150,000, prefixed a "V" to his common or old family name, and took the next steamer as a saloon passenger for Paris, there he intended to spend his fortune.
