Physician Who Has Grappled Hand to Hand with Deadly Scourge, Tells How China is Suffering.

Haddonfield, N. J., Feb. 21.—In this town resides Dr. Charles S. Braddock, Jr., former medical commissioner of the government of Siam. Out of his store of terrible memories and experiences Dr. Braddock tells some of the terrors of the black plague.

"There is no hope for a victim of the bubonic plague," said Dr. Braddock. "Medical science has no treatment. It is too ready to study. In Siam a young physician, with desperate bravery, attempted to perform an autopsy on a victim's body. He dropped dead within a few hours, sinking into a state of coma before he was able to tell other physicians what he discovered.

"A physician cannot save the lives of those who are stricken. His duty is to prevent the spread of the disease and that is a tremendous task. In the plague camps in Siam, every morning we would line up the inmates and I would put along the line the pulse of each man, woman and child. At the slightest sign of fever I would direct the person to step back. That order was the death warrant. It meant that that person would be dead before night. We had to segregate the sufferers from the well. Walls would line up from various parts of the line whenever one stepped back. Every person would be shivering with fear during the inspection.

Rats Die First. "The first symptom of the disease, in a town, would be the dying of the rats. The fleas on the rats carry the disease. As soon as a rat dies the fleas go to living rats or to other rats or to other animals. We paid 2 cents each for live rats. We dipped them in tar barrels, to fasten the fleas to them, and then burned the rats in bonfires. Many brave Siamese soldiers who handled the rats gave up their lives. The children are always the first sufferers. I was greatly puzzled until I observed that the fleas on the dogs with which the children played. In one Siamese city, in 1907, 14,000 dogs were killed and 24,000 rats were burned in the place which had appeared. We put a sheet iron guard around each house, as it burned, to keep the rats from jumping over any living animal on the premises, including pets and cattle.

"Thousands of persons died before the epidemic was finally checked. The first symptoms of the disease in a human being, are headache and fever. Within a few moments the glands in the body begin to swell with the poison. The glands of the groin, throat and arm pits grow to abnormal size. If the victim were conscious of the pain, he would be tortured. Fortunately by this time the victim is usually unconscious. His body is poisoned throughout. Then the heart stops. While the victim is still alive, his body turns black in color.

"This form of the disease is the mildest and least dangerous, in epidemic form. The pneumonic form is the worst. The disease can be communicated by the breath. In the milder form, occasionally, there are recoveries, but in hundreds of cases of the pneumonic form, there are no recoveries. The breath of the victim is like a poisonous blast, carrying death. This is the form of the disease which is killing thousands today in China. Doctors, nurses, missionaries, all take their lives in their hands in fighting the disease. Even the germ-killing masks which they wear over their faces and through which they breathe are not sure to save them. The very air is full of the germ. The only way to stop such a plague is to take all the sufferers into the open air, at a great distance from a city, and after death, to bury them in the open air. In the year 1910 the bubonic plague swept over Europe and killed 30,000,000 people, one-third of the population. Medicine was of no use. More today about a cure than I do now. All we can do is to know in preventing the spread of the epidemic."

DREDGING LASTED AS LONG AS INSPECTOR

Robert Loggie is Asked Why His Fee Exceeded Contract for Dalhousie Work by \$21,400?

Ottawa, Ont., Feb. 22.—Robert Loggie, of the firm of A. & R. Loggie, Loggieville, N. B., whose firm, it is alleged, did dredging at Dalhousie to the extent of \$31,000, only \$9,600, of which was authorized, gave evidence before the Public Accounts Committee today. This is the work on which there was the further mistake that the work was to have been done at Bathurst, but Dalhousie was named in a telegram ordering the work. Mr. Loggie said if the work had not been authorized they would have quit. So long as the government inspector remained on the dredge they kept on dredging. Mr. Crockett read the telegram ordering the work. It stated expenditure to be limited to \$9,600. Mr. Loggie said he did not take it that way. He understood that if they were stopped dredging they would keep on.
