ROLAND HILL'S HOUSE AT MILLTOWN BURNED.

St. Stephen, May 16.—Weather dry and windy; four fire alarms this morning and as many yesterday. A serious fire in Milltown has destroyed the residence of Roland Hill, but now seems to be under control. Woods fires are running back of Milltown and calls and one that sprang up beside the C. P. R. track near Moore's mills after the train passed this morning seems to be sweeping down the valley towards the Oak Bay road.

WON'T THIS REDSKIN HAVE ONE BIG SPOON AT THE CORONATION?

Kitselas Indian Chief With \$8,000 Tucked Away in His Jeans, Starts to See The King Crowned.

Vancouver, B. C., May 15.—Far from his haunts along the Skeena, there arrived in Vancouver Chief Weddihahd, of the Kitselas tribe of Indians. For many years he has been up-country, but now he is going to the Coronation in London. He has \$8,000 in good Canadian money for the purpose of making the trip and by his many jaunts around this city, evidently does not care a hang for expenses. He leaves by the C. P. R. tomorrow for the eastern seaboard. Chief Weddihahd has gifts to offer the Great White Father, one being the totem of his tribe, carved in black slate by the best craftsmen of the tribe.

Then there is a beautiful banner of buckskin, with a copy of the tribe's totem burned as a border on one side and a bunch of maple leaves in the upper opposite centre. This will be engraved with the names of all the Indian chiefs attending the coronation from Canada, a formality which will be attended to when the chiefs meet in Ottawa.

Knows King George.
The chief reverently referred to the late King Edward and showed a reply he had received from the equestrian to his message of condolence when the sovereign died.

Expanding his chest beyond normal he said: "I know King George; he is just the same as my brother. I know Sir Wilfrid Laurier and Frank Oliver, superintendent of Indian department. I was introduced to them last October. I know Earl Grey, I met him in Prince Rupert in 1908."

Chief Weddihahd is short and heavy set. He is 39 years old and a widower. "I will get another wife before long," he said. Asked how a white girl would suit him, he replied: "Well, perhaps I might take a chance."

Regarding the trip across the Atlantic he feared he would be very sick. Then he loyally said: "But, then I am going to see King George, and this sick sickness won't kill me, so what do I care?"
