Apohaqui, April 24.—Once more the fragrant blossoms of the Trailing Arbutus have made their appearance, some very beautiful specimens having been gathered at the Falls, a beautiful and picturesque spot, situated about a mile from the village, between the huge hills which skirt the northern bank of the Kennebec.
