THOUSANDS OF MEDALS AWAIT OWNERS.

A total of 735,338 war medals have been issued in Canada, according to recent figures from the Department of National Defence. This total is made up as follows: 1914-15 Stars 72,822; British War Medals 34,215; Victory Medals 368,291.

Due to the fact that the addresses of those entitled to them are not available, 2,541 1914-15 Stars, 77,706 British War Medals and 43,394 Victory Medals are still awaiting issue.

In the course of the last 12 months, 245 Stars, 11,011 British War Medals and 5,768 Victory Medals, making a total of 18,157 were despatched. The recipients, in the majority of cases, were traced through the efforts of Defence Headquarters, 15,082 postcards notifying ex-soldiers that their medals were available and requesting a permanent address having been mailed.

In addition, 593 Memorial Crosses, issued to mothers and widows of those who paid the supreme sacrifice, are still awaiting claimants. These Crosses, it was explained, were forwarded to the last known addresses and returned undelivered.

Memorial plaques and scrolls, totaling 4,794, given by His Majesty the King to the next of kin of those who lost their lives during the war, are also awaiting issue. More than 3,000 of these were despatched and returned owing to those entitled to them having changed their place of residence.

Any ex-soldier who has not received his war medals, any mother or widow who has not obtained the Memorial Cross, and any next of kin who has not received the memorial plaque and scroll should make application for same to the Deputy Minister (Director of Records), Department of National Defence, Ottawa, or advise the Dominion Command, G. W. V. A., Citizen Building, Ottawa—The Veteran.
