Running through everyone's mind was the fact that the plane could have demolished quite a few homes and lives in the built-up area. Most of the people first knew that something had happened when they awoke to the sound of sirens from fire engines, ambulances, airport trucks and police speeding north on Airport Rd.

A neighbor on Sills Rd. was preparing to take a trip to Niagara Falls, when he noticed the ill-fated DC-8 taking off again from the airport and making an unusual noise. A few minutes later the sirens told him the

plane had crashed. All emergency vehicles in the surrounding area were called to the scene and the Malton Firefighters worked in shifts all day Sunday and through the night.

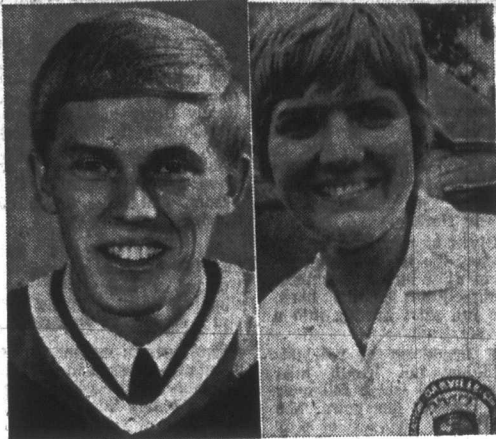
Mr. and Mrs. Stein, from Baarn, Holland, arrived July 14 to visit their children and

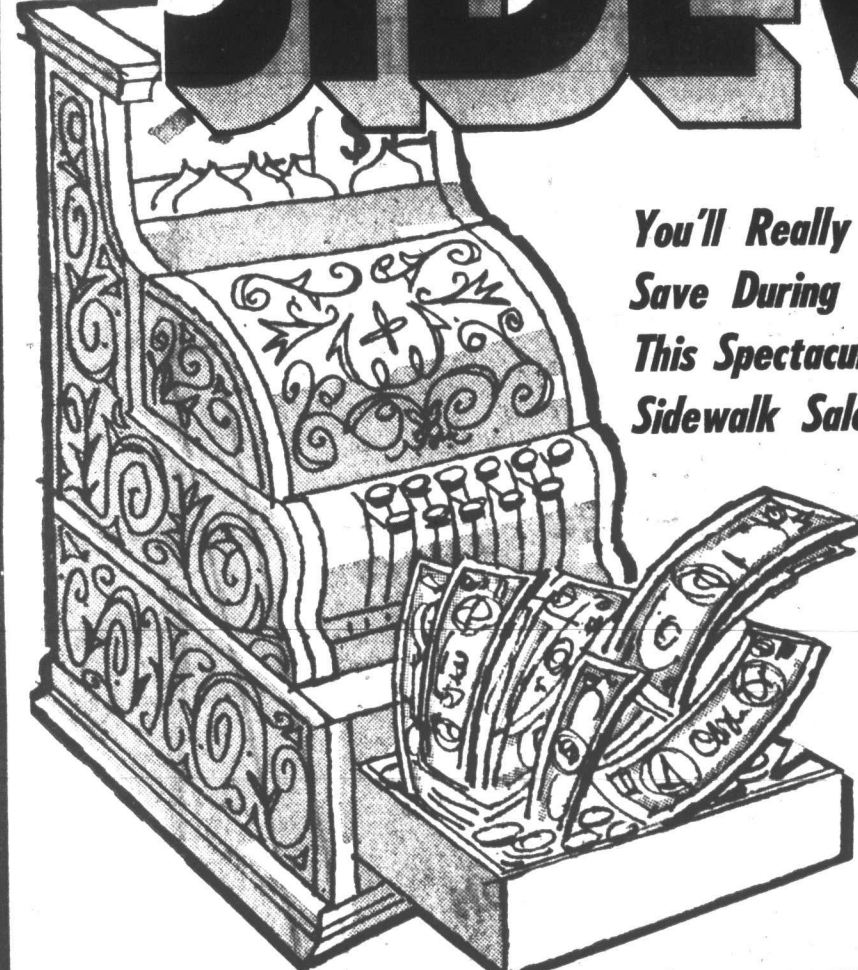
