

11th May 1813: My Intellectual faculties are not impaired, my duties are the same which I fulfilled for a number of years past, I continue still to fulfill them in the same manner. The Chiefs in Council were then satisfied. I flatter my self that my private and public conduct entitle me to the same degree of respect and Confidence as formerly. To corroborate what I have just stated, I take the liberty of subjoining to this letter, the Certificate of our venerable Missionary Mr. Marcou, which is not equivocal: That Gentleman is a better Judge than the Chiefs and members of the Council, and knows more what is suitable to them, than they do themselves. I also subjoin a Copy of my Commission, of the general order dated 30th January 1828, and of my acquittations &c. I hope you will find every thing as it should be.
