

point of high land (a beautiful situation tho' not so much in extent as the above piece of No. 4.) forming the most easterly angle of the former Mill Block, and which I should consider a fair compensation, might be given to that lot — It will be necessary also to mention that although the fall through the reserve is 25 feet 9 inches, still, in consequence of the existence of one or two small swales just under the high Bank on lot No. 9. joining the Mill Block to the west, before the person contemplating the purchase of the privilege could calculate on availing himself of more than 23 feet of that head he would be obliged to secure about 10 acres of that lot (No. 9) which would complete the privilege with a 25 feet head — or the purchaser could then use all the fall through the tract —

You will also see Sir, that the Indian Village is, in the Schedule, returned independent of the rest of the Survey altogether.

It is my impression that should the party purchasing the privilege not desire the Village, or should it not be sold at Your Approaching Sale — in the course of a short time when the Mill property shall have been improved you will have no difficulty in disposing of it. —
