

APPENDIX I.

Table showing minimum temperatures between June 12th and September 5th, 1903.

The records of Peace River Landing were made in the river valley, those at Dunvegan on the edge of the plateau about 700 feet above the river. All the other records were taken at about 2,300 feet above the sea, the average elevation of the country. In each case the date given is that of the morning following the night the minimum temperature was registered. The thermometer never registered above 40° when the night was clear. A constant check was kept on the thermometer by reading it whenever the temperature was low enough to freeze a damp cloth. This occurred in every instance when the thermometer registered 32°, so that all these readings are a fraction too high.
