ABANDONED

The Board of Health Give up Their Scheme for Establishing an Isolation Hospital

The local Board of Health held an important meeting yesterday afternoon, when the matter of establishing an isolation hospital for the treatment of scarlet fever and diphtheria came up for discussion and the scheme was finally abandoned. It was the regular meeting of the Board, at which the following members were present: Chairman Dr. Charteris, Dr. Bray, Dr. G. W. Cornell and Chas. Hadley. Health Officer Dr. Hall and Inspector Anson Mounteer were also present at the meeting. The local Board of Health held an neeting.
At the last meeting of the Board

At the hat meeting of the Board a committee composed of Dr. Hall and Chairman Dr. Charteris were appointed a committee to interview the members of the Council and the managers of the two city hospitals to gather what information they could regarding the prospects for establishing isolation wards in connection with the hospitals.

Dr. Hall stated that this committee had done as they were instruct.

Dr. Hall stated that this commit-tee had done as they were instruct-ed and found the managers of both hospitals willing to enter upon the project grauting that the Council would guarantee a fair interest on the money expended in putting ap the baildings and also that they would be paid \$5 per week for each patient treated.

Gentlemen,—Your committee to whom was referred the matter of arranging between the two hospitals in the city for the establishment of contagious wards on their respective grounds for the care of such cases for the city, respectively report that we went carefully into the matter with the hospital authorities and also the fuspector of hospitals for the province, Dr. Bruce Smith, who pointed out objections to the scheme contained in the statute requiring each hospital to be placed 150 yards from any dwelling, and also that same statutes require municipalities to maintain such institutions and he states that they are not receiving and will not receive Government aid, Your committee therefore recommend that no further action in this direction be taken.
