We are informed, says the Quebec Chronicle, that Sir Allan McNab has received the appointment of Chairman of the Provincial Railway Commission.

The Mayor of Toronto, J. G. Bowen, Esq., has been in town on business connected with the Toronto and Quebec Railway.

An important judgment, as affecting the public good Railway Company, was delivered by Mr. Justice Beeson, in the Circuit Court, on Wednesday.

The judgment of the Court dismissed the plaintiff's action, and maintained the incidental decree, finding damages against Rochelle for \$2,000.

On Monday afternoon the new Cunard Steamship Arana, originally the Peras, was launched from R. Steele & Sons' Building Yard at Green Point.

We learn from F. N. Gibbons, Esq., proprietor of the Newfoundland Electric Telegraph, that the enterprise meets with the best encouragement from English Capitalists, and that Newell and Co. of London are desirous of purchasing the Newfoundland and Prince Edward Islands.

A large hall has been planned above the dome of the west end station of the South-eastern Railway Company, which, by sympathetic electrical action, fills every day, simultaneously with the hall at Greenwich Observatory, and thus indicates to all London the true time.

Ship Waverley has arrived from Hobart Town with twenty thousand pounds in gold, £200,000, but no later news. Government has chartered the American ship Telemachus, at Liverpool, to carry emigrants to Australia.

In a few days the screw Schooner Frank, which has been built by Messrs. Frank, assisted by the Geographical Society, and placed under the command of Captain Inglefield, will set on another search for Sir John Franklin, through Jones and Smith's Sound, and afterwards along the western shores of Baffin's Bay.

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Summary.

The Algiers journals inform us, that swarms of locusts have again made their appearance in that country, but that the same alarm is not felt as on former occasions, as premiums are now offered for the destruction of these devastating insects, and as soon as they appear are at once destroyed, and are thus prevented from extending their ravages.

It is not in America alone that cities increase rapidly in population. In 1710 the island of Bombay had 16,000 inhabitants. These had increased in 1816 to 161,500, and in 1849 the population was no less than 269,119; of which 19,291 were nominal Christians, 1,132 Jews, and 124,000 Mohammedans.

Difficulties with the French Minister had been in Mexico. The American Consul had been arrested in Anapaula, for having threatened to shoot the mate of a steamer, who was about to bear down a notice of her sale, posted up in front of the Consul's office.

In Italy, Piedmont excepted, every 114th man of the population is in exile. Every 109th would be higher than in France, higher still in Hungary, higher still in Poland, higher still in Greece or Baden.

Cotton-felt mattresses are beginning to take the place of the older kinds in New York, because they are said to retain their elasticity longer, to be proof against vermin, cleaner, more healthy, as well as easier to use, and almost fifty per cent cheaper.

Melick, the celebrated razor stop man of London, is now one of the most ardent of agriculturalists, and irrigates 170 acres of land by means of subterranean pipes, worked by steam power.

A private letter states that Gen. Fitzpatrick, who was appointed Governor of Buenos Ayres, has authorized the reading of Bibles in Schools, and made liberal appropriations for their support.
