

LIVE STOCK MARKETS

Offerings were heavier at the western cattle yards to-day, there being all told nearly 40 carloads of stuff on the boards including 800 sheep and lambs and 1,300 hogs. Buyers were present from Buffalo and acted more freely in the stocker line than they did last market day. Prices held well all round. About half a dozen carloads of beef went out from the Harris abattoir.

Export Cattle—Some dealers are doing a little desultory buying for shipment to Great Britain via St. John and Portland at prices ruling from 34c for bulls to 4c and 4 1/2c for good shipping steers.

Butchers' Cattle—Trade was good so far as the better quality cattle were concerned, but some of the poorer stuff was somewhat slow of sale. Prices show very little alteration, ruling from 3 1/2c to 3 3/4c per lb for good to choice cattle, odd fancy cattle touching 4c. Common cattle are dull at 2 1/2c to 3c per lb.

Stockers and Feeders—Light stockers sell for \$2 80 to \$3 35 per cwt and good half-fat steers for feeding fetch 3 1/2 to 3 3/4c per lb. Some good stock in this line will sell.

Sheep and Lambs—There was an active demand and prices held firm at 3c to 3 1/2c for export and good butchers' sheep. Bucks sell for 2 1/2c. Lambs are in good demand at \$4 75 to \$5 20 per cwt.

Calves—Steady at \$2 to \$8 per head. Choice veals are wanted.

Milk Cows and Springers—There continues a fair enquiry at \$25 to \$46 each. Good newly-calved cows are wanted.

Hogs—Although offerings were heavier to-day prices did not decline. Singers fetch 5c per lb, weighed off the cars, light hogs \$4 70 to \$4 75 per cwt, heavy \$4 45 to \$4 50, stores \$4 50 to \$4 55, sows \$3 to \$3 25 and stags and rough hogs \$2 to \$2 25.

A horse belonging to A. S. Clarke Mount Forest, was killed on the G. T. R. there last week. Mr. Clarke refused \$160 for the animal a short time ago.

A. C. Brunet, aged 26, tried to fix an electric wire at Montreal and received a fatal shock. He leaves a widow and young family.

Thirty thousand people, mostly workmen and orderly, demonstrated at Barcelona Sunday against the torture of the Anarchists at Mont Juich fortress.

Col. Higinbotham, Registrar for South Wellington, will act as returning officer for West Wellington instead of Sheriff McKinn, at the coming Ontario election.

Mrs. Arch. McDougall, Allenford, aged 84 years, died on Thursday. The funeral took place on Saturday and was largely attended. The deceased lived in Bruce about 40 years, having moved from Vaughan, York Co.—Port Elgin Times.

Mr. Peter Smith, father of Mr. Alex. Smith, the Liberal organizer, died at his home in Saugeen, Bruce Co., on Saturday, at the age of 80 years. He was buried on Tuesday.

Chief Game Warden Tinsley has estimated that the deer at present in the province number 1,000,000. This is an increase of one-fifth from the number existing five years ago, and is a tribute to the measures taken for their protection.

George McAulay of Southampton had a narrow escape from drowning on Friday last at the mouth of the river. He was standing on the edge of the ice when it broke and he fell into the water. His father, Mr. Alex. McAulay, happened to be near at hand, and hearing the cry of alarm, he hastened to him and succeeded with a great amount of difficulty in rescuing him.

Mr. Peter Smith, the pioneer settler of Saugeen, passed away at his residence near Port Elgin, on Saturday last February 5th, in his 80 year. He was a native of Invernesshire, Scotland, but had lived in Bruce County for over 50 years. He leaves a family of six sons and three daughters, one of the former being Mr. Alex. Smith, Liberal organizer for Ontario. The funeral took place to Port Elgin cemetery on Tuesday afternoon.
