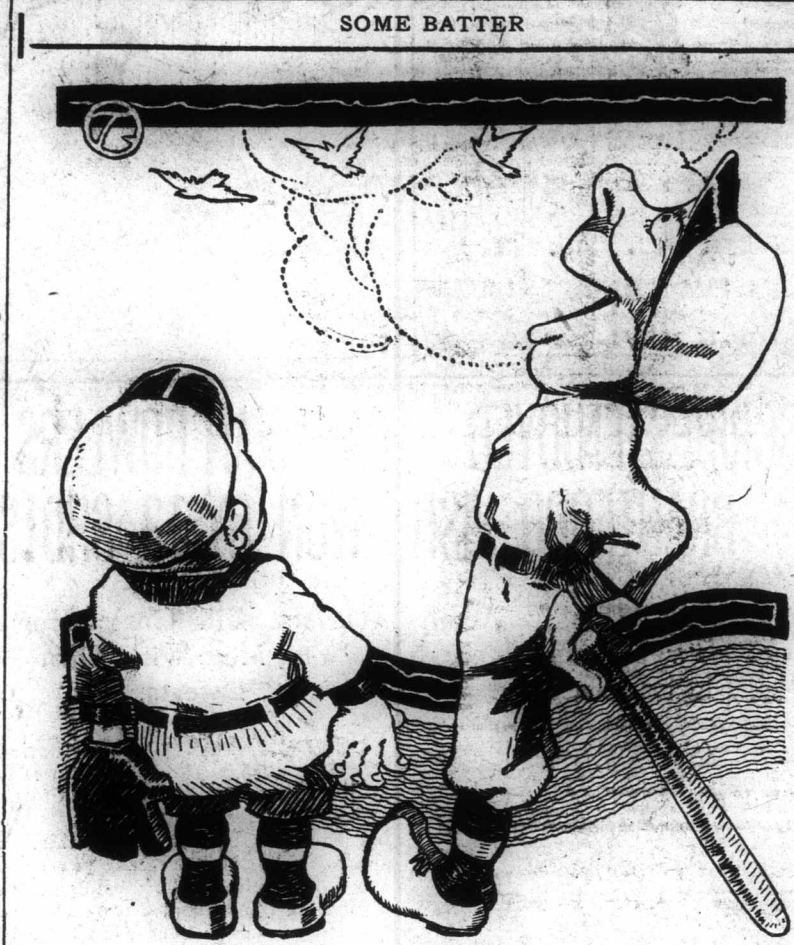

Sporting Editor, Courier:

Has A GOT to return to first base? or is A entitled to hold second base after said ball was pitched? The umpire behind the bat called play ball not noticing A had not returned to first base. The base umpire also did not notice it until told by players opposing A.

EAST WARD.

Yes, decidedly. Base runner should have protected himself by asking batter to step out of box until he returned to first. In that case pitcher would have delivered an illegal strike.

Berlin Divided a Double Header With League Leaders.

BERLIN, July 23.—London and Berlin divided a double-header here this afternoon before a large booster's day crowd, with the scores 4 to 2 in both meetings.

The first fixture, which went ten innings, was a pitchers' battle between Bradshaw and Heck, with the former having the better of it. Rank supporters alone defeated the locals. Bradshaw held the Tecumsehs to four scratch hits, but the fielding behind him was of the unsteady variety. In the ninth frame, White's Hopes tied up the score on Dinsmore's single and White's double, but in the tenth a scratch hit, an error and some daring base running won for the visitors.

The second game which went seven innings to allow the teams to catch the trains east, found Berlin playing errorless ball. Beebe was no puzzle, while Bramble beat London for the second time of the series. The locals piled up three runs in the fourth on clean hitting.
