A SOCIAL EVENING. A good sized crowd attended the meeting at the Liberal Club Rooms Saturday night.

two soldiers of the 125th, which was a thriller. The speakers were W. F. Cockshutt, M.P., W. S. Brewster, K.C., Capt. Stewart, J. H. Ham, M.P.P. and Lt. Col. Cutcliffe. Col. Cockshutt gave a vivid account of the Parliament buildings' fire.

In the course of his remarks among other things the President said: "The proceeds of the large Western crop and of the munition orders for the British Government are now coming into circulation. General business is improving in all lines, and promises early months of the war seems to have passed, and the Canadian people are going about the business of developing their country in a serious way, and are exercising a very necessary economy."

The adoption of the report was seconded by Mr. C. E. Ritchie, Vice-President, who commented on the adverse effects the war had had on financial transactions. "We must hope," he said, "for a speedy (and at the same time satisfactory) termination of the war, when it would be reasonable to expect a gradual return of normal conditions with a resultant favorable improvement in the general conditions of business and financial affairs throughout Canada."

A hearty vote of thanks was passed to the officers and staff of the Company. The same Board of Directors was re-elected, and at a subsequent meeting of the Board the following officers were appointed: James J. Warren, President; D. W. Karn and C. E. Ritchie, Vice-Presidents, and E. B. Stockdale, General Manager.

CHANGES IN COMMAND.

LONDON, Feb. 7.—Changes of great importance in the direction of the war are contemplated, says the Daily Sketch. It asserts Earl Kitchener probably will leave the War Office.

The Sketch also says Sir William Robertson, now chief of staff, probably will take over active direction of the war without interference, except from the Cabinet as a whole, and that a civilian of real ability for organization will become Secretary for War.

In the event that Earl Kitchener leaves the War Office, the Sketch adds, he will do work of an important character elsewhere.

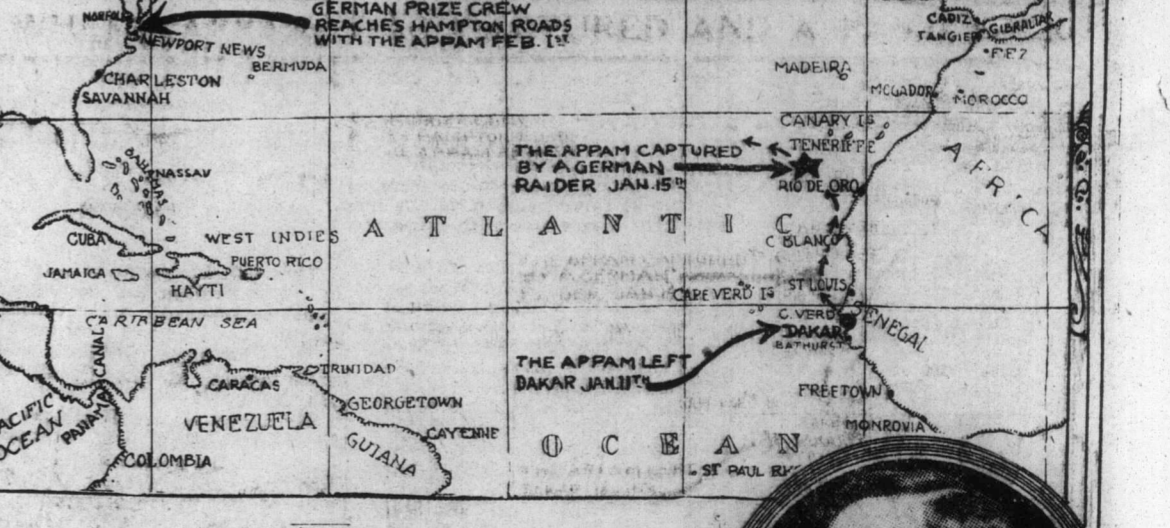
