UNCLASSIFIED. Whisky-drinkers in Hamilton are setting up a war on Feb. 1 the price per drink will be 10c.

A joint stock company has been formed in Germany to lay a cable direct from that country to the United States.

The Montreal harbor commission were in Buffalo on Friday inspecting the grain elevators and terminal facilities.

The London Times hints that France will be offered concessions in Madagascar as a set-off to the French shore rights in Newfoundland.

The Government steamer Stanley has been ordered to search for four men adrift at sea who were blown away from St. Mary's Island, Nova Scotia waters.

The value of apples shipped from Toronto for export to England on Thursday was \$18,000. Other shipments to Great Britain were: Cattle \$1,000, bacon \$14,000, agricultural implements \$1,000.

The Sherwood House in Cincinnati took fire on Friday morning, when 60 or 70 persons were sleeping inside, many of them being theatrical people. The women were rushing shrieking into the corridors and had to be forcibly prevented from jumping out of windows.

The fire was caused by a candle which had been left burning in a room. The fire was extinguished by the fire department. The damage was estimated at \$10,000.

THE DEATH. William Herbert, one of the oldest citizens of Manitowick, Quebec, died Saturday.

Mr. Lester, mother of Mr. J. Lester, died in Cleveland, Ohio, aged 78.

General Michael Ansell, the distinguished British engineer, who was in charge of the construction of the Great Eastern Railway, died in London.

Mr. Mary Hill was just died at Ithaca, N.Y., aged over 100 years. The record is that she was baptised in England in December, 1788.

Mr. Walker's will was filed for probate in Detroit on Saturday. It bequeaths to his children \$100,000 and to his wife \$50,000. The will is valued at \$150,000.

THE LABOR WORLD. The fire which destroyed the Cuyamaca mill in New York on Wednesday night is reported to have cost the lives of over 500 men, women, and children.

All the works at the Audenried and No. 100, Pa., coal mines were shut down on Saturday. The cause was a strike of carpenters, and 3,000 men are shown out of employment.

Four Canadians bound for the Michigan lumber woods to work for 31 days on a board, having through tickets from Toronto to Sylvania, Mich., were turned back at Fort Huron, where the steamer labored.

United States Consul Goodnow reports to Washington that in response to a query as to whether Chinese, Japanese or labor-saving devices are being used in China. There are more than 100,000 Chinese employed in the mines to work from sunrise to sunset for 7 to 10 cents a day.

THE NORTH GERMANY LINE Steamship Co. proposes to have next season a passenger service by which passage will be made from New York to La Rochelle, France, in five days.

The British steamer Prince George, from Yarmouth, has been laid up at Boston. She was chartered by the American government for the Hawaiian Islands.

A Atlantic Transport Line steamer, the Atlantic, which arrived at New York on Tuesday morning, brought into port Capt. Honorable and members of the crew of the British transport steamer Glendower, which was abandoned at sea in a gale near Philadelphia on Feb. 10.

THE GOVERNMENT TROOPS OF MOROCCO, commanded by Prince Mariani, have defeated the Tabori rebels in a big battle. It is chief rebel's son and 19 others were captured. This is expected to finish the Tabori rebellion.
