A JUST JUDGE DEAD.

Judge Lippincott, who recently died in New Jersey, was widely known as a strong and upright member of the sjudiciary. He is best remembered as the presiding judge at the trial of the perpetrators of extensive ballot-stuffng frauds committed at Jersey City several years ago. Judge L'ppincott was a Democrat, and the offenders were of that party. They had the protection of several powerful politicians who sought to get them off lightly; and they were also backed by the lawless element of the city. Judge- Lippincott, however, did not flinch. AN UNRELIABLE CENSUS.

The Montreal Witness takes strong grounds against the system which the Dominion Government purposes to adopt in taking the census. The Witness points out that under the de jure system the enumerators in the country districts will count members of families who are employed as domestics in towns or cities, or who happen to be boarding away from home. When the city or town enumerator comes along he will be more than likely to count these same 'individuals, and therefore one person will be made to count twice in the total. Those who have moved to the United States will, as the Witness states, undoubtedly be counted by the census takers there, while a very large share of them will be counted here as well. The excuses the government gives for reverting to this "lying system," as the Witness well terms it, is that were there an honest count; the census to be taken next year would compare unfavorably with the census of ten years ago.
