When the new fall wheat was reported on in November, it was described as having had a good start at seeding time, and the only fear then expressed was that the young plants had perhaps too much head. The remarkably open winter, affording little or no covering of snow most of the time, and changes of temperature varying from extremely mild conditions to intense cold, led growers of fall wheat to fear the outcome. The cold, dry, and generally backward spring was also unfavorable. However, the general situation in the third week of May may be described as better than was expected, although reports vary greatly in describing the condition of the fields. Some reports are enthusiastic, while others from the same district speak of failure more or less marked. High lands did well compared with flat or low-lying places, and rich, sharp, well-drained soils also prospered. Fields sown early did much better than those got in later, and wheat sown on sod was markedly ahead of that grown on stubble land. A considerable area at scattered points will be plowed up and resown to other crops, but in many cases barley will be drilled into the "patchy" spots. The presence of the wire-worm was pointed out by a number of correspondents, but no serious injury was reported from that or other insects. The most favorable reports, relatively, regarding fall wheat, come from Lake Erie and Lake Ontario counties.

Swine are kept in large numbers, and have wintered, well, but there are reports of heavy mortality among spring litters, a large number of young pigs dying when about a month old. But for the fact that many farmers have lost confidence in the stability of the market, the output of hogs would be immensely increased.

How to Put Them on and Take Them

There is nothing which more com-pletely changes the effect of a pair of of Properly. eyeglasses than the habit of crowding them on the nose with one hand. The best efforts at fitting and adjusting are

The proper way to take off glasses is to take hold of the bridge and lift off gently without dragging or pulling out of shape. To take off spectacles take hold of the right temple with the right hand and lift it off the ear. Then turn the head to the right and the left temple will fall off easily.

The average wearer of glasses when he is cleaning them takes hold of the bridge. The consequence is that he gradually works the bridge out of shape, and every rub he gives the lens gives a twist to the bridge, and in course of time the bridge or the lens breaks when he least expects it. There are probably more glasses broken in are probably more glasses broken in this way than any other.

The correct way to clean them is to take hold of one of the eye pieces where the glass is screwed on the outer edge and clean the lens, and then reverse the glasses, take it by the other end piece and repeat the process on that lens.

The public debt during the past year has increased five million dollars, and a deficit of \$800,000 is expected for the coming fiscal year (nine months), ending March 31, 1907.

An important announcement, hurriedly glazed over, foreshadows a huge national loan. The Dominion Government has an overdraft of £400,000 at the Bank of Montreal, while treasury notes to the amount of three million dollars are outstanding. Moreover by 1910 something like \$140,000,000 must be repaid or refunded, not including the demands for the Grand Trunk Pacific, reckoned at \$10,000,000 per annum.
