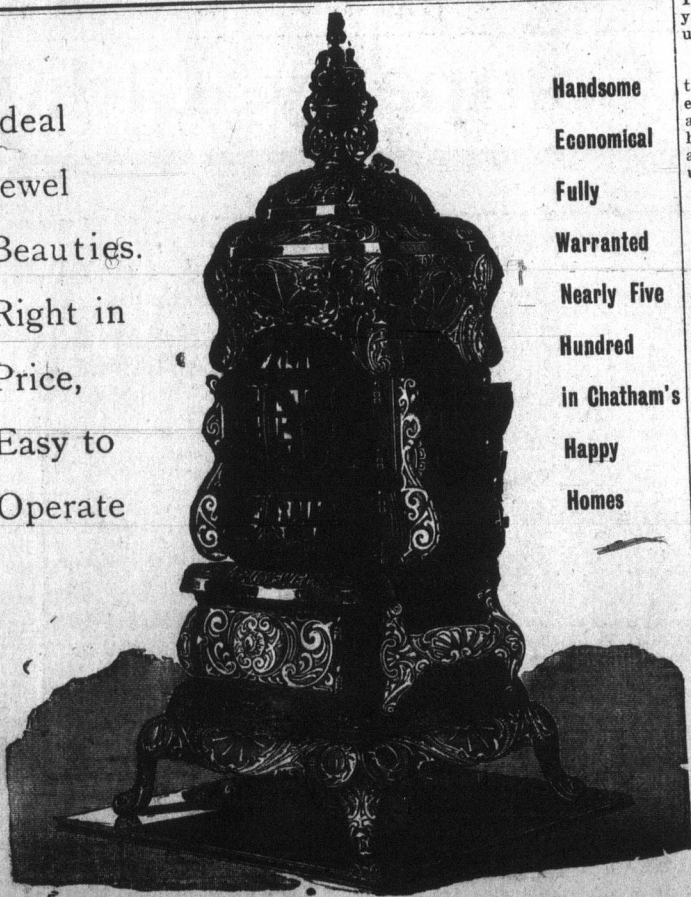

IN COURT OF JUSTICE

Joseph Cram And His Associates Charged With Turkey Stealing

COME UP AT SESSIONS

Joseph S. Cram came up before Judge Dowlin this morning, and elected to be tried before a judge with no jury, and was remanded until the second day of the sessions. He is charged with stealing turkeys in the Township of Howard. He pleaded not guilty.

On the 21st of November ten turkeys were stolen from the farm of Joseph S. Cram, of the Township of Howard. In the morning of the next day, fresh tracks of a team of ponies without any shoes were found at the gate and also the tracks of a man walking in from the tracks of a man walking in from the gate to the turkey coop. There were also tracks of two men found between the coop and the shanty in which Cram lived. The ponies were tracked to Bothwell, and a day or two after, ten turkeys were offered for sale to a butcher in Bothwell by a man named Clinger-Smith. Cram, Clinger-Smith and Murray have all been arrested, and they had their preliminary hearing before Justice of the Peace Ingalls, of Thamesville. They were at that time committed for trial. Clinger-Smith and Murray are out on bail for \$500 apiece. Cram could not get bail.

James Brethune, of Windsor, was brought to this city last night, where he is charged with stealing a raincoat valued at \$12 from a man named McDonald, and a watch and chain valued at \$35 from another man. He was brought up this morning in the Police Court and pleaded guilty. He assisted in the recovery of the property and paid all expenses in the case. He was let out on suspended sentence.

Four little colored boys came up in the Police Court this morning for running away with a horse and buggy belonging to James McGeachy. The boys wanted a ride and quietly took the outfit. They were caught as they were tying it up again. Three of the boys were at that time with a warning, as they claimed that the other boy took the horse and rig and invited them to have a ride. The fate of the fourth boy is not yet decided. He is at present locked up in the Police Court cells.

Ed. Moran, of Tilbury, was up in the Police Court this morning charged with being drunk. The magistrate allowed him to go with a fine, as he is an old pensioner of the British army. He has served in all 21 years under the British flag.

RUNAWAY LOCOMOTIVE

Winnipeg, Nov. 30.—Three men were killed and four injured in a railway accident yesterday afternoon in the Canadian Northern yards. One of the victims was William Neil. The other two men killed are foreigners.

An engine was being put in readiness to take out a freight train, and the engineer and fireman had stepped off, when it is supposed the throttle blew out, and the monster started off at a terrific pace, ran into a switch and crashed into a dead train on a siding, on which a number of men were unloading supplies.

The jar threw a concrete mixer the full length of a flat car, almost instantly killing three men and seriously injuring four others.

NOVEL INVENTION

OIL IN RALEIGH

It was reported yesterday afternoon that oil had been struck in the Chatham and Tilbury Oil and Gas Co.'s well on the Parsy farm in Tilbury. Mr. McCallum was out to the well yesterday afternoon to see what truth there was in the report. He said this morning that no oil had been struck. The drillers are now down to a depth of 1,200 feet, and they intend to drill about 200 feet deeper.

Quite an important strike was made yesterday on Mrs. Finn's farm on the fifth concession of Raleigh. This well is three miles east of any other paying well, and is the farthest north of any of the wells.

A FINE HOSPITAL

The Lacrosse Sunday Chronicle, published in Lacrosse, Wis., contains a column write-up of the Lutheran Hospital, of that place. Miss Kate Wemp, formerly of this city, is the superintendent of the hospital, which is one of the most modern equipped in that state.

There have been admitted to the beds in the hospital during the year 1905, 781 patients, making the total of 13,341 hospital days. This is 1,338 more than last year. The number of discharges taken for the year is 195, number of treatments given, 375. Many times the capacity of the beds has been taxed to the limit, as may be noted by the surgical report, and surgical work still increasing with results that have been eminently satisfactory.

MUTINY ON WARSHIP

Norfolk, Va., Nov. 30.—Men from the cruisers Tennessee and Washington, which conveyed President Roosevelt on his trip to Panama, while in Norfolk yesterday, declared that a "mutiny" on the Tennessee occurred while the cruiser was being coaled on the isthmus for the return trip home.
