Editorial Notes.

In its report of the Southern Baptist Association of New Brunswick the St. John Sun says that Dr. Keirstead presided at an educational session before the body, and also delivered an address on the Acadia Forward Movement.

The Nova Scotia Tourist Association has issued an exceedingly attractive booklet entitled "Halifax, the Garrison City by the Sea." The cover is of very pretty design and the illustrations and letter press of the best quality.

That Wolfville needs a curfew bell, the toll of which shall warn our juvenile citizens of the streets and to their homes, is the opinion of many of our most public spirited citizens. This is not the first time the wisdom of such an institution has been reverted to in our columns, but at present, we are happy to say, that the prospects for its realization are much brighter than ever before.

In order to establish the scheme the Town Council has simply to take advantage of the power vested in it by the Provincial Government and pass a by-law providing that minors under a certain age shall not appear on the streets at night after a certain hour.

The importance of a regulation of this kind cannot be exaggerated. Our streets after nightfall is a perilous place for our children to frequent, and it is the duty of our laws to protect immature youths from the weakness or carelessness of parents which might otherwise lead to ruin.

The advertisement of the Provincial Exhibition at Halifax makes its re-appearance in our columns to-day. With the grand success scored in 1897, in the face of difficulties well nigh insuperable, there can be no doubt as to the issue.

The Commission has lately been strengthened by the appointment to its members of Mayor Wyman, of Yarmouth, representing the western portion of the Province, and Mr. George C. Lawrence, of Port Hastings, from the eastern section.

The prize list, which is now being distributed in large numbers, is a most creditable volume offering on the aggregate over \$16,000 in cash prizes, besides a large number of medals, diplomas and special awards.

The matter of the securing of suitable special attractions is an important one. Exhibition visitors demand that they should be amused as well as instructed.

It is the aim of the Commission that this exhibition should draw the city and country districts into closer union, to provide a producer for the one and a customer for the other, as well as the best holiday of the year for all concerned.

The Wolfville Public Schools.
