A free school law to work efficient-4 25 ly must be just in its provisions or it will constantly be exciting irritation, and the patent injustice we have referred to, should at once be swept away. The simple remedy appears 50 to be to tax each Parish or County for the support of one class of schools, the amount levied to form one fund, out of which each school is paid its fair share according to the average number of children attending it, and if wealthy districts desire a higher class of education than is afforded by such established class let them tax themselves for such advantages. It is positively unjust that the rich district should, in addition to being lightly taxed as we have shown a case in Sackville, should have an additional allowance from the Provincial Chest to pay a first-class teacher, while its more highly tuxed beause its poorer district has to be satisfied with a third-class teacher and la lesser Provincial allowance. are animated by no hostility to the school law, but draw attention to what we believe are grave mistake, to have them removed from the Statute Book.
