FOR PURE ELECTIONS.

Rev. Dr. McLeod Addresses a Few Words to the Electors of York.

"To make effective our crusade against bribery and corruption, and to make such things less likely to be done in future elections." - Letter Nov. 9th, 1900.

To the Electors of York: On the 17th October last I addressed a letter to you as a candidate for parliament, asking your support. Your response was such that on election day, Nov. 7th, I received what I believe was a majority of the legally polled votes in the county.

On November 9th I addressed a second letter to you, expressing my hearty thanks for the magnificent support you gave me in the face of the tremendous efforts and the practically unlimited corrupt influences employed by my opponents. The votes you polled for me were, I am happy to know, your own free exercise of your citizenship right and duty, uninfluenced by a single unworthy consideration.

In that letter of thanks I assured you that "the crusade against corruption was not yet ended," and that it was intended to proceed against our opponents for their flagrant violations of the law. At a meeting held on the 19th of November a committee was appointed to have charge of the case. The members of the committee who have especially had the matter in charge, together with the attorneys, have done their duty with great diligence and faithfulness. They have kept in view the purpose announced at the outset of the campaign and throughout it, and have rendered such loyal and efficient service as I can never forget. They deserve the thanks of all who desire that election contests shall be freed from the practices that have degraded them.

The object of all we set out to do in prosecuting the case against Mr. Gibson was stated in my letter of November 9th, thus:—

"To make effective our protest against bribery and corruption, and to make such things less likely to be done in all future elections."

The letter I now address you is to say that what I promised would be done has been done, and done successfully.

That we would meet difficulties in pursuing our purpose we knew. The difficulties were more and greater than are usual in such cases. Because we had a strong case our opponents were determined to keep it from trial. Including Mr. Gibson's long and extraordinary efforts were made to defeat our undertaking. But all obstructions were overcome, and all attempts to "stall" the petition resisted, and nearly six months after the election the date of trial was fixed.

On Monday of this week (June 3rd) the case came to trial. Knowing that we could prove our charges of bribery, etc., Mr. Gibson admitted corrupt practices, and the Court declared the election void and the seat vacant.

Besides causing the seat to be vacated I have secured the written pledges of representative men of both parties that all future elections in this county will, so far as they are able to control them, (and they promised to do their utmost to control them) be conducted without resort to illegal or corrupt means of any kind. To have secured these two things, (1) the vacating of the seat because Mr. Gibson got it by wrong methods, and (2) the pledge of clean elections in the future is the best evidence that you and I have not worked together in vain. It is a long step towards thoroughly purifying elections in this county, and perhaps far beyond it.

I am glad to have been permitted to have part in a work so important and so much needed. It has been a great pleasure to find in both political parties so many stalwart friends of electoral purity. Nothing in all the campaign has been more gratifying than the heartiness of the response to the call for clean elections. To deliver even one county from the domination of corrupt influences, by whatever party or person exercised, is worth a great struggle by us all. To make permanent such a reform is an undertaking that appeals to all good citizens, and which should command their warmest support.

The men of York have shown what can be done when, putting aside minor differences, they stand together for the best citizenship and for its legitimate and untrammelled expression at the ballot box. The country at large has recognized their emphatic declaration of purpose to make an end of electoral debauchery, at least in their own county.

It only remains for them to firmly

The match was closely contested up to the ninth inning, when the local club won by Manton driving in the winning run after one man was retired. The score stood: Alerts, 7; University of Maine, 6.

LARGE EXPENDITURES.

Revenue and Expenditure for Eleven Months Ending May 31.

OTTAWA, June 7.—The statement of revenue and expenditure for the eleven months ending May 31st last, was issued by the department of finance today. The revenue for the eleven months was \$46,571,284 as against \$45,107,144, or increase for current fiscal year of \$1,464,140. The revenue compared with the expenditure shows a surplus of \$10,965,030, or in round figures \$11,000,000. This is an extraordinary expenditure. If capital expenditure, which amounted to \$8,731,242, is deducted, there is still left a surplus of one million and a half dollars. However, it is not expected that this or any amount will be deducted from the public debt during the present year, although there will be a good surplus over the expenditure on ordinary account. The expenditure for eleven months was \$35,626,254, an increase of \$3,050,487, as compared with eleven months in 1900. The capital expenditure for eleven months was \$8,731,242, an increase of \$1,502,751. In regard to the revenue it may be said that there was an increase from all resources, except customs, which shows a very slight reduction of about \$90,000. The month's returns in customs, however, show a considerable increase. The total revenue for the month exceeded that of May last year by \$355,056. The expenditure for the same time was increased by \$231,000.




