THE ROYAL VISIT.

Thought That the Duke of Cornwall May Visit Fredericton.

Local Government Has Arrangements of Prince's Visit to Province.

May be Entertained at Government House as Was His Father.

It now appears probable that the Duke of Cornwall may visit Fredericton. Mayor Crocker called upon the Government yesterday and was informed that arrangements for the Duke's visit to New Brunswick were left almost entirely with the local government, and it was the present opinion of the members of the executive that the capital city of the province would be among the places visited by the Royal party. The government will ask Fredericton and St. John to appoint committees to confer and cooperate with the committee of four members of the executive, Hon. Messrs. Tweedie, Pugsley, Dunn and McKeown, in arranging the details for the visit of and reception to the Duke. His Worship gave the government to understand that it was expected that if the Royal party visited here that they would be entertained at Government House by the government.

PROVINCIAL GOVERNMENT.

Concluded an Interesting Session Here Last Evening.

Arrangements for a Suitable Reception to Lord Minto.

Railway From Gibson to Chipman and the Newcastle Coal Fields.

The local government concluded their session last night. Governor McCrellan and Hon. Mr. Dunn returned home by early train this morning and Hon. Mr. Farris went down river on the steamer. The Attorney General and Hon. Mr. Hill went to St. John upon the 10 a. m. train. The Premier, Hon. Mr. LaBrosse and Hon. Mr. McKeown went to Hartland to take part in the exercises accompanying the formal opening of the new bridge.

"At its session last evening the Government met representatives of the Canada Railway and Coal Co. and approved of the contract which the Company will enter into for the construction of the railway from Gibson to Chipman. It was stated that the Company would at once proceed with the survey of the line and that operations will begin at an early date. It is expected to have some portion of the railway in operation next year. Plant for coal mining at the Newcastle fields will be installed simultaneously with the building of the railway.

Reception to Lord Minto.

A subject discussed by the executive was a suitable reception to the Governor General upon the occasion of his visit here. Hon. Messrs. Tweedie, Pugsley, Dunn and McKeown were appointed a committee to communicate with the Federal government upon the subject and to cooperate with the Fredericton City Council committee in arranging for a reception upon a scale and of a character befitting the event. It is likely that a magnificent reception will be tendered His Excellency at the Parliament buildings, and that parades, fireworks and other special features will greet the vice-regal party at this the capital city of the province. Lord Minto and party will arrive at Fredericton at five o'clock in the afternoon of July 20th, and remain until midnight of the 21st.

First K. C. Appointed.

Hon. H. A. McKeown was appointed a K. C., the first New Brunswick gentleman to receive that honor since King, Edward VII.

A Trip to the Pan-American.
