The Foster Government may well appeal to the farmers of New Brunswick for support. Recognizing as it does the importance of the farming industry, the government has done more in the last three years for agriculture than any previous administration in the history of the province.

The expenditure in the department has increased from year to year since the government came into power in 1917 and every cent has been honestly spent to benefit teh farmer directly.

Agricultural Instruction

Schools for instruction in agricultural subjects have been well attended at Woodstock and Sussex, and agricultural education has been carried on in the different school districts throughout the province. School gardens have added greatly to the interest and profit of the pupils. Special instructors and experts have been engaged from time to time and literature dealing with the problems that confront the farmer have been widely distributed.

Women's Institutes Increased

Women's Institutes have been increased and have done good work in bettering conditions on the farm.

Dairy Industry

Co-operative Creameries have been established and greatly encouraged throughout the province and the number of live stock has been greatly increased. One of these is located in Fredericton.

Sheep on Every Hillside

The number of sheep in New Brunswick has been increased one hundred per cent. in the last three years by the progressive policy of the Foster Government. New Brunswick now takes its place as one of the leading provinces in Canada in the matter of raising large quantities of mutton and wool.

By providing a system of credit to the farmers to aid them in purchasing sheep, fifty thousand dollars was provided and four thousand sheep purchased and added to the farmers' flocks for breeding purposes. The department of agriculture conducted a vigorous campaign for increased production with the result that New Brunswick has today 280,000 sheep as against 140,000 when the Foster Government came into power

Providing Limestone

One of the latest acts on behalf of the farmer has lately been brought forward by the present Minister of Agriculture, Hon. Mr. Tweeddale. It is the development of a supply of ground limestone for the farmers. Is was discovered by experts that in order to obtain the best results from the soil in all parts of the province that the deficiency of lime in our soils has to be remedied.

STEPS WERE TAKEN TO PROVIDE FARMERS WITH LIME AT A MINI-MUM COST.

The Government has purchased a limestone quarry in St. John County containing an unlimited supply of high grade lime rock which is being ground for agricultural purposes and can be delivered to the farmers, freight prepaid, for \$5.00 per ton. The CHEAPEST AND BEST LIME SUPPLIED ANYWHERE IN THE DOMINION. This will mean a big saving in the fertilizer bill. A heavy item on the farm.

Foster Promises

To give increased assistance for the erection of flour mills. To assist in the purchase of seed grain, and to aid in every way in the increased production of farm products is the aim and policy of the Foster Government.

Farmers Co-operate

In carrying out these aims and policies the Government asks the co-operation of the farmers of New Brunswick.
