CITY TO CONTINUE THE PAVEMENT LOOP ON SMYTH STREET

This Summer's Construction Programme Completed by the Committee.

YORK STREET HOODOO BLOCK TO BE REBUILT

Gravelled Streets and Macadam Roads Not Standing Up Under Auto Traffic.

The Roads and Streets Committee of the City Council have decided to complete the loop of the tarvia pavement between Brunswick and Charlotte streets on Smyth as a portion of the summer's construction programme.

This portion of the programme will in all probability be submitted to the City Council at the regular May meeting next week for final approval before the work is commenced.

Extensive work will be necessary this year to put the gravel streets in the centre of the city and the macadam roads leading out of the city into fit shape, and considerable work is expressed that work of that kind has not already been commenced in Fredericton.

AUTO CRASHED INTO BOULDER

R. B. McFarlane and A. F. Yerxa Injured in Accident Last Evening.

The first serious automobile accident of the season occurred last evening about seven miles above Long's Creek on the Fredericton-Woodstock road when a car owned and driven by R. Bruce McFarlane, of this city, crashed into a boulder at the side of the road and was wrecked.

Jack Doran, the well-known guide, was a member of the party who were returning to Fredericton when the accident occurred. He escaped without injury. While it is believed that Mr. McFarlane suffered several broken ribs this could not be definitely ascertained by the medical examination made following his arrival in the city. Constable Yerxa suffered cuts about the head in addition to a bad shaking up.

CHARLES A. BELL DIES OF POISONING AFTER OPERATION

Avery's Portage Man Was Pioneer in the Lumber Trade in Oregon.

SEPTIC POISONING FOLLOWS OPERATION

Relatives here have received word of the sudden death of Hood River, Oregon, on April 15th, of Charles A. Bell, at the age of 55 years.

Mr. Bell had been in the enjoyment of good health until a few days before his death when he complained of poor circulation in his hands. The night preceding his death he became very ill and was taken to the Community Hospital at Hood River, where it was seen his condition was serious and an operation necessary.

Deceased was one of Hood River's leading citizens, going there in 1850 from Avery's Portage, where he was born. He was first engaged in lumbering and took an active part in the development of enterprises in his adopted home, was a member of the Mount Hood Development Association and was instrumental in having the Interstate bridge over the Columbia river constructed.

He was born at Avery's Portage and is survived by his widow and one son, Fred, of Hood River; one sister, Mrs. Kate Young; one brother, Henry Bell, three nephews and six nieces, Ernest, David and Roy Bell, Mrs. Murray Hoyt, of South Devon, Mrs. Pearl Beck, of St. Stephen, Mrs. Fred Edney, of Taymouth, Miss Bernice Moffatt, of St. Stephen, Mrs. Angus McBean and Mrs. E. Pierce, of New York.

APPROPRIATION OF \$10,000 FOR BRIDGE OVER TAXIS RIVER

Plans for New Structure in the Parish of Stanley Given by Premier Veniot.

VOTE \$12,500 FOR NEW INTERNATIONAL BRIDGE

New Structure Between McAdam and Vanceboro Must Await Maine Action.

An appropriation of \$10,000 for a new bridge across the Taxis River in the Parish of Stanley, York county, replacing the bridge which was known as Red Bridge, is included in the bill providing for an expenditure of \$400,000 this year on new bridges in New Brunswick, which passed in the Legislature last night.

John A. Young, one of the veteran members for York, who has been annually pressing for the rebuilding of the Red Bridge, was not in the House last night when the bill came up—his delicate state of health making necessary his early retirement—and C. D. Richards, leader of the Opposition, asked upon his behalf whether the Taxis river bridge was included in the list of eighty new bridges to be built.

Premier Veniot said there was an appropriation of \$10,000 and the new structure was to be a 125-foot bridge to be built.
