BRITISH MARKETS.
London.—There were over 2,000 cattle sold, besides some 300 killed, down at Deptford Market. The weather was sultry, which affected the trade both on Saturday and to-day, but notwithstanding this fact the undertone to the market was firm, and prices were more than maintained, especially for Canadians, as they sold at the first time in many years at the same prices as Americans, viz., 14c to 15c per lb.

Glasgow.—Supplies of cattle were exceedingly moderate, and in consequence the undertone to the market is strong, but prices show no actual advance as compared with a week ago. Canadians are selling at very high prices, some bulls making \$150 to \$175 each. Last week's current prices for best steers were 13 1/2c to 14c, and secondary, including bulls, 11 1/2c to 12 1/2c per lb. The total receipts of cattle at this market for the season up to the end of June show a decrease of 4,448 head, as compared with the same period last year.

Liverpool.—The strong feeling which has prevailed in the market of late still continues to be the main feature of the trade, and prices have scored a further advance since this day week owing to very light supplies of both Canadian and American cattle. The holiday in Liverpool to-day and in Manchester tomorrow on account of the King's visit tended to interfere with the demand, which was low, but firm. American cattle sold at 15c, and Canadians at 13 1/2c to 14 3/4c per lb.

MONTREAL LIVE STOCK.
Montreal.—About 100 head of butchers' cattle, 500 calves, 300 sheep and lambs and 1,050 hogs were offered for sale at Point St. Charles stock yards this forenoon. Trade was good, but prices of cattle were half a cent per pound lower than on last Monday's market, but hogs are higher in price. Pretty good animals sold at 4 1/4c to 5 1/2c per lb., and the common stock at 2 1/2c to 4c per lb. Calves sold at \$2.50 to \$8 each, or 3c to 6c per lb.; sheep sold at about 3 1/2c per lb., lambs at \$3.50 to \$5.50 each. Good lots of fat hogs sold at from 8 3/4c to 9c per lb. The offerings of live stock at this market during the week consisted of 3,175 head of cattle, 1,550 calves, 350 sheep and lambs and 1,925 fat hogs.

COBALT STOCKS.
The feature of the market yesterday was the strength developed in Nova Scotia, which advanced from 40c to 47 1/2c, this being occasioned by a report of a shipwrecked fish on the property. A private wire to the city stated that the new find had been uncovered for a distance of sixty feet, with a showing of from two to six inches of ore. Heaver was quiet, but firm, closing at 30 1/4c. Temiskaming closed at 88 1/4c. Otis was firmer. There was a sharp advance in Rose, the new find from London that the stock had been introduced on the London market under strong influences having a good effect on the shares.

LIVE STOCK.
Receipts of live stock at the Union Stock Yards were 122 carloads, consisting of 2,616 cattle, 29 hogs, 138 sheep and 21 calves.
The receipts at the yards were the largest in their history, except the opening day, when 1,047 head, when 140 carloads were on sale. But this is the largest run ever received on a Monday. The management, at the request of many drovers, tried to do away with the Monday market, as they did not want to be away on Sunday from their homes.

Exports.—No export steers were reported sold, but dealers stated that they were worth about the same as last week. Bulls sold at from \$4.50 to \$5.25; cows, \$4 to \$5.25.

Ruthers.—The best butchers' heifers were being held over for export. Whaley & Coughlin sold one load of butchers, 22 in number, 1,047 lbs., at \$3.95, and A. W. Maybelle sold 16 heifers, 1,070 lbs., at \$4.95 each. There were no pickled lots, as drovers were waiting for Tuesday, but prime pickled steers and heifers are worth \$5.75 to \$6, the same as export heifers. Lots of good butchers' sold at from \$5.25 to \$6, medium \$4.15 to \$5.55; and \$4 to \$4.85; cows, good quality, \$4.25 to \$4.75; common cows, \$3 to \$4.

Milkers and Springers.—About 15 milkers and springers found ready sale at \$3.50 to \$60 each, and two extra quality Holstein cows brought \$100 each. A few calves were sold at \$1.50 to \$2.50. Receipts light; prices firm, but unchanged, at \$3 to \$6 per head.

Sheep and Lambs.—Export ewes, \$3.50 to \$4 per cwt.; rams, \$3 to \$3.25; lambs, \$4 to \$7.75 per cwt.

Hogs.—There were only 29 hogs on sale, which were sold by A. W. Maybelle to Whaley & Coughlin at an order at \$5.15 per cwt., fed and watered at the market.

H. P. Kennedy reports sales at \$7.85, fed and watered, and \$7.60 for cars at country.

FARMERS' MARKET.

Hay quiet and steady, with sales of 15 loads at \$13 to \$14 a ton for No. 1. Hay is unchanged at \$12 a ton. New hay is expected next week.
