1700 Women Vote in St. John

In the next St. John civic election, there will be 1700 women who may vote, about 1000 women having been added to the voters' list as the result of the new law giving the vote to married women property holders on the same terms as to men.

Landry vs. Bathurst Lumber Co.

In the Supreme Court of Appeals in Landry vs. The Bathurst Lumber Co., a suit for damages for false arrest, an appeal from the decision of Judge McKewen in favor of the defendant was dismissed with costs. This was heard before Chief Justice McLeod, Judge Grimmer and Judge Barry, the latter dissenting. A new trial was refused.

To Teach Returned Soldiers

T. B. Kidner, who has been appointed by the Dominion Government as vocational secretary to arrange for the training of returned soldiers during convalescence, will start classes first in Toronto shortly. Teaching in English, arithmetic and business college subjects, in addition to manual training and agriculture will be given. The classes will be established in each of the convalescent homes in Canada and teachers and material provided.

Chatham Board of Trade

At its meeting Wednesday night, Chatham Board of Trade adopted resolutions calling upon the Government for a Royal Commission to enquire into the condition of Canadian coastwise trade; asking for legislation to protect our Coasting schooners, owners, and Seamen in their just rights at the Coal Ports of Nova Scotia, instead of the long delay at said ports, and asking for a subsidy or bonus to steel ship building for a number of years.

Sergt. Ronald Allen Gets Commission

One of the few men who went over with the first contingent and who returned without serious injury is Sergt. Ronald Allen of Chatham. He has come back with a commission in the 123rd North Shore Battalion, S. Z. A. C. He has been through practically all the fighting which the Canadian contingent did during the war, and he was with the 13th Battalion, and came through Ypres, Estubert and Givenchy. He was struck with shrapnel on one occasion but recovered and went back to the trenches. When he left France on Jan. 18, conditions at the front were much better and much more comfortable than when he first went over. He is of the opinion that the Allies now have too many guns and too much ammunition, to say nothing of the men, to allow the Germans to break through if they do try it this spring as they are expected to do.

Chatham's 10th Annual Seed Fair

The 10th annual Seed Fair of the Northumberland Co. Agricultural Society, No. 9, (open to the County) will be held at the Temperance Hall, Chatham, next Wednesday, March 2. The prizes have been increased. This Seed Fair has the sympathy and support of both the Provincial and Dominion Departments of Agriculture. The Provincial Department of Agriculture at Fredericton assists with a grant towards prizes mentioned in this list. The Seed Branch of the Dominion Department of Agriculture is giving assistance by way of meeting the expenses of men sent to judge and deliver addresses at the Fair. The exhibits will be judged by S. J. Moore, Maritime Representative Seed Branch, Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, judging at 11 a. m. A Lecture will be delivered in the afternoon by a representative from the Department of Agriculture, with a general discussion afterward. The public are cordially invited. The quantity of Grain required is only 1 bushel, and Potatoes, Beans, etc. 1/2 bushel. Seed sent to the care of Seed Fair Committee, A. B. Matthews, Henry Gordon, P. S. Bremner or A. G. Dickson, Secy., will be carefully looked after. All exhibits for competition for the prizes must be in the Temperance Hall, Chatham, on Wednesday, March 2, by 9 a. m., and shall not be removed until the close of the Fair. No entrance fee will be charged. Pres. Geo. E. Fisher and the other officials are seeking to make this Fair the best that has ever been held.
