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LOCAL AND OTHER ITEMS.

Twenty-five thousand people have been left homeless by the recent floods at St. Louis, Mo.

This is the feast of the patronage of St. Joseph, special services are held morning and evening in St. Joseph's convent in this city.

The steamer Elliott brought to Charlottetown a large cargo of corn for George E. Hall, from Boston on Thursday evening last.

Friday next, the first after the octave of Corpus Christi, is the Feast of the Sacred Heart. Special devotions will be held as on the First Friday.

Toronto advices say that a United States Steel trust is about to establish works at Port Colborne on the Welland Canal, that will employ 2,000 men.

His Lordship, the Bishop, started on his Confirmation itinerary in the western part of the Island on Monday last. He is accompanied on the itinerary by Rev. Gregory McLellan, D. D.

About one hundred and fifty children received First Communion in St. Dunstan's Cathedral on Thursday last, Corpus Christi, and about a hundred and twenty renewed their First Communion of last year. In the afternoon his Lordship, the Bishop administered Confirmation to about one hundred and fifty.

No Boston steamer sailed from here yesterday; but the Halifax will resume her Friday trips from here on Friday next. The Olivette will commence her trips on Tuesday next. After that date there will be two steamers a week until further notice. Later advices say there will be no steamer on Friday.

A Sofia despatch of the 11th says:—It is reported that the village of Enidje in the district of Adianople, consisting of five hundred persons, was attacked on June 2nd, by the Bashi Baskouks, and the entire population with the exception of two hundred men were massacred. The village was pillaged and the booty carried off to neighboring Turkish villages.

The steamer Halifax, on her way from this port grounded at Point Peasant while entering Halifax harbor on Thursday morning last, during a dense fog. The cargo was lightened and the steamer was floated the same evening without sustaining any damage. Most of the passengers were forwarded by rail. Captain Ellis says the accident was due to variation of the compass.

A PETITION from thirty-two hundred inhabitants of the Province was presented to the Minister of Public Works by D. A. MacKinnon, M. P., Senator Yeo, Messrs. Hackett and Leforgey, on Thursday last, requesting the construction of a pier near Cape Traverse. The Minister said he had not received the engineer's report but he deemed the work practical and expressed his warm sympathy with the object of improved winter communication.

The prize list of the Prince Edward Island Agricultural and Industrial Exhibition for 1903 is issued. It is a pamphlet of 72 pages containing all information regarding entries and classification of exhibits, prizes, etc. The exhibition will be held at Charlottetown from the 22nd to the 25th September. The Statistical year book of Canada for 1902, is issued by the Department of Agriculture, Ottawa, and compiled by George Johnson, F. S. R. Statistician. This is a book of 780 pages filled with most valuable information regarding the history, resources and government of Canada. Statistics on all branches of trade and commerce, banking and insurance, as well as population and the census are to be found in this valuable volume.

The new summer time table on the P. E. I. Railway went into force on Monday last. Trains leave Charlottetown for the west at 8 a. m., 9:20 a. m. and 1 p. m. Trains leave Tignish at 8 a. m. and 1 p. m. Trains from the west are due to arrive at Charlottetown at 11:55 a. m., 2:25 and 8:45 p. m. Trains leave Charlottetown for the east at 6:55 a. m. and 3:50 p. m. Trains leave Georgeville at 5:40 a. m. and 1:35 p. m. and Georgetown at 8:15 a. m. and 2:20 p. m.

SUNDAY last, being within the octave of Corpus Christi the Blessed Sacrament was exposed during high Mass in St. Dunstan's Cathedral. The Mass was celebrated by Rev. Father Campbell, and the sermon preached by Rev. Dr. Morrison. After Mass the Blessed Sacrament was borne in solemn procession around the church, the Manstrance being carried by his Lordship, the Bishop, with Rev. Dr. McLellan and Rev. Father Beaton as deacon and sub-deacon. After the procession, the service closed with Benediction of the Blessed Sacrament.

COLIN C. Ferguson, B. A., Gold Medalist, McGill, and son of Senator Ferguson, who has been in the Assurance business in Toronto for several years has been successful in the recent examination conducted by the Royal Institute of Actuaries of Great Britain and Ireland. This entitles Mr. Ferguson to the degree of A. I. A. (Associate of the Institute of Actuaries). Mr. Ferguson's success is the more creditable when it is known that about 90 per cent of those who take these examinations for the first time fail.

The third trial of Gillian for manslaughter came to a close at Summerside on Thursday afternoon last. The jury went up at 5 o'clock and came down at 9:30 reporting a disagreement. They were sent back by the Chief Justice, and locked up for the night. On Friday morning they returned still disagreeing. They were accordingly dismissed and on the suggestion of the Attorney General the court ordered that the trial be postponed until the November term, and that the prisoner be released on bail of \$2,000 for himself and \$1,000 each for two securities. It is said the jury were about evenly divided for conviction and acquittal.
