Was It Murder

This morning, Mr. H. D. Reid had NICHOLAS ANGEL, WHOSE DEAD BODY WAS RECENTLY BROUGHT HERE, REPORTED TO BE VIC-TIM OF FOUL PLAY.

To-day many in the city wer shocked to hear it reported that Mr. Nicholas Angel, formerly a representative of the **Telegram**, had been murdered, and not killed by accident as formerly believed. The deceased, it will be remembered, had not left here long on his way to Montreal, when the news of his death as the result o an accident, was received. According to the story told by friends, the de

ceased was on a railway train going from Quebec to Montreal, when he was attacked in the car which he occupied after leaving Reviere Quelle, was robbed of \$60 and was flung from the car into the river near and left to die. His friends say that he lived for 10 hours afterwards and escaped alive, but in a terrible state from the river, and in his pocket a pathetic letter, giving the facts of the case and addressed to his mother, was found In it he gave the names of the gang who attacked him as McDonald. By yesterday's mail, two letters were Ouelle, who attended her son in his last moments. These are written in French and were sent to-day to the Christian Brothers for translation. To-day a reporter of the Telegram called on the friends of the deceased who refused to say anything as to the details of what Mr. Angel had said in his letter, and would prefer waiting to get the substance of the Priest's letters when they are translated. We learn that the facts of the matter have been placed before Inspector General Sullivan, who will leave no stone unturned to get at the root of matter, and if the deceased has met foul play, to bring the authors of his
