Dear Sir.—I am not in politics. In the two elections of 1908 and 1909, in the District of Trinity, (in which my father was born), I offered my services to the country and was twice returned at the bottom of the poll, since when, beyond voting, I have taken no part in politics. I write thus so that what follows will not be misunderstood. I have seen in the papers and have sometimes read fairly long letters from the Self-Determination League of Ireland, signed by the former Secretary of the League, Mr. Thomas Kelly. It is, in my opinion, lining up Protestants against Catholics. It is not in any way converting Protestants to the Irish cause, any more than if the Orange Society started publishing a series of articles against the Pope would convert a single Catholic to Orangism. It is just as well to recognize facts. This league helps to make sectarianism more rampant than it already is in this sectarian ridden country. Anyone with half an eye can see how things are here. ### Adrian's Bull.

Editor Evening Telegram.  
Dear Sir.—Ireland is one of the pivots of world-politics to-day, and the settlement of her difficulties are essential for the Empire's security, if not for the world's peace. It follows that a full and free discussion of the Irish problem is eminently desirable; and that I am glad to see indications in your columns that the public mind is becoming exercised about it.

The problem is far too serious, however, and the need for a solution far too urgent, to justify the wasting of space and time on irrelevances and dead issues. In this connection I wish to comment upon the discussion which has been started on by several of your correspondents over the alleged Donation of Ireland by the Laudabilliter Bull of Adrian IV., principally touching the authenticity of the Bull.

"I am free to confess a perfect ignorance as to whether the Bull in question was ever issued. I will further confess that I have no intention of trying to enlighten myself on the point; and that I would as soon think of entering into a historical research in order to settle the length of Strongbow's sidewhiskers. The fact is that if the original Bull could be physically produced with its seals intact, the rights and wrongs of the Irish quarrel would not be swayed by the weight of a hair. The further fact is that the production of a Bull of Benedict XV., dated last Sunday, would have precisely the same result.

If the Laudabilliter Bull ever existed, and was published to the Irish people of the 12th century, I have no doubt that it was treated as the Par-nell Rescript of Pius IX was treated by their descendants—i.e., publicly burned—and that, as now, they took their religion from Rome and their politics from home. It is ridiculous to speak as if a nation could be given away like a pound of tea.

I am informed that one of the upholders of the Bull's authenticity considers himself to be the champion of Protestantism in this discussion. I cannot withhold the comment that the spectacle of a champion of Protestantism defending by implication an extension of Papal jurisdiction which would be rejected by the most fervid Ultramontane is novel, to say the least. It would be an awkward precedent, once established. Did not a successor of Adrian's donate England to Philip II of Spain?

Finally, Sir, let me suggest that these gentlemen would do far more good if they would leave Adrian and his Bull in peace and devote their efforts to the real living issues of the Irish difficulty. They will find no lack of subjects for discussion.
