

Railroads Co-operate.

The railroads are assisting with national advertising, and in almost every city in the province organizations have been formed, supported largely by the municipal governments whose function it is to distribute literature advertising their particular communities from the scenic, climatic and other standpoints of interest to the tourist and prospective permanent resident. The provincial government has been asked to set aside an annual grant of \$500,000 a year for publicity purposes, but no action has so far been taken.

The Pacific Northwest Tourist Association, which acted for the province of British Columbia and the states of Washington and Oregon, backed financially by the three governments, collapsed this year as a result of the refusal of the Oregon Senate to appropriate the required amount. Oregon has now initiated a publicity campaign of its own on an extensive scale, and Washington and British Columbia are expected to act accordingly in order that the momentum created by the former organiza ion may not die.
