NEW HAVEN RAILROAD.

January Results—Gain in Gross and

Early Estimates—Gain in Gross and

Reduction in Expenses—8 Years

Since Surplus Was Reported in

January.

Boston.—New Haven Railroad's

final results for January were even

better than expected, with a surplus

after charges of \$188,226. This con-

trasts with a deficit after charges of

\$233,113 in Jan., 1924, and a deficit

of \$126,059 in Jan., 1923, when com-

bined effects of a rigorous winter and

aftermath of the 1922 ship strike

were being felt.

Not since 1917 has the New Haven

covered its interest charges in Jan.,

this ordinarily being one of the light-

est months of the year from a traffic

standpoint, while expenses are fre-

quently swelled by difficult winter op-

erating conditions. The result this

year may be regarded as significant

an promising.

Industrial recovery in New England

had not become very pronounced in

January, New Haven's freight earn-

ings were a trifle below Jan., 1924,

but there was a substantial gain in

passenger earnings which was re-

sponsible for an increase of 1.1 per

cent in total gross. February is ex-

pected to show a more distinct up-

ward trend in business.

The excellent gain in net operating

income in Jan. was due both to in-

crease in gross and reduction in ex-

penses. The latter was scaled down

to \$249,552, or about 3 per cent, there

being reductions both in maintenance

and in transportation accounts. The

result was that New Haven held op-

erating expenses down to 78.2 per

cent of gross against \$1.5 per cent in

Jan. last year.

New Haven has now earned a sur-

plus over interest charges in every

month since Feb., 1924. That month

produced a deficit of only \$112,249.

Feb. this year is expected to produce

a good surplus. In 1924 the bulk of

New Haven's substantial surplus af-

ter charges of nearly \$3,000,000 was

produced in the months August to

December, both inclusive. It is rather

interesting to note that in the six

months from Aug. 1, 1924, to Jan. 31,

1923, New Haven earned a surplus

after charges of \$5,845,042.

ters for a dissolution of Parliament

which would occur this coming Sat-

urday. Nominations for the new

Parliament, he announced, would be

made on March 24th, and polling

would take place on April 3rd.
