The number of accidents resulting in lost time shrank from 406 to 44, from 1914 to 1924, or more than 89 per cent. Accidents with lost time per 100 emplovees shrank from about 10 per cent, to one-half of one per cent. Other figures show the same impressive

Accidents were found to be caused generally by one of three causes: (1) the chance-taking spirit; (2) lack of familiarity with the job; (3) known hazards, many of which could be eliminated. More than 20,000 such hazards have since been eliminated throughout the "plant"-which covers all of Delaware and Pennsylvania and part of New Jersey.

Usually all old buildings with domes, with imitation Greek or Roman columns and other "pagan" features are "Renaissance," while all country mansions with twisted chimneys are "Tudor."



REGINA, Sask., Dec. 10 .- Yields of gina barrister.

RESULTS IN INCREASED YIELDS.

Llewellyn Bratt, who farms two and a half sections of land south of Regina, and Clarence Westbaugher, both of whom tested the new method of cultivation, reported that there was an apparent increase of about fifteen bushels to the acre. The new system was tested out on an acre plot of land similar to the land on which the ordinary methods were employ

Both agree that the new method is not so effective on summer failow land but on the stubble there is a material difference in the yield.

Believing that immense quantities of straw were not meant to be destroyed, Mr. Secord experimented for a few years to find some methods to use the straw profitably. He found that if grain were planted shallow instead of deep in the spring, that the roots would penetrate farther into the ground and secure more nourishment than if planted deep. In some cases the roots formed into a mat on meeting the harder ground.

By covering the seeded ground with straw to a depth of two inches, Mr. Second discovered that it did not pre-
