SPOILING FOR A FIGHT. No matter how small the dimension of a rebellion are in any nook or corner of the earth, or how little the grievances which bring it forth, the Americans are always ready to render "aid and comfort." to the insurgents—so long as the rebellion does not takeplace in their own territory and amongst their own people. In that case their sympathies are reversed, and they set at defiance the very first principle under which their constitution is formed, viz., that "governments derive their just power only from the consent of the governed." They could shed crocodile tears over the wrongs of Ireland, and with that extraordinary degree of consistency for which they have always been famed, employ thousands upon thousands of Irishmen to keep down their own Ireland of the South. When Poland made a brief but gallant struggle in 1863, they had a robellion on their own hands to attend to at the same time, and therefore an exhibition of sympathy with the Poles would not have been politic, so the Russian officers who visited New York during the Polish revolt were received with unbounded enthusiasm. The Cuban revolt occurred at a more seasonable opportunity for their manifestation of their deep sensibilities with the Cretes; and now that a rebellion has broken out in Cuba they act as if demented. Although it has never been shown what grievances the Chandlers, the Summers, and the other wise men in Congress wish the American government to recognize the independence of the "Queen of the Antilles," or at least ackowledge it as a belligerent power. Beyond a regard for the welfare of the Cubans, no one of course supposes they have an ulterior object in view; but then too practical a manifestation of sympathy is sometimes awkward, and perhaps France and Britain might object to hot-headed Americans interfering in other people's business—in which case the States, according to the statements made by many of its public men and a large portion of its press, would go to war. The Hudson Bay Company.

A writer in the Ottawa Times gives the following interesting summary of the history of the great landed monopolists who stand in the way of opening up the unbounded regions of the Northwest to diviligation.

The corporated on the 2nd of May, 1660. The first Governor was Prince Supert. The original capital subscribed amounted to £10,500 sig. So successful had their operations been at the end of twenty years, that in order to make their yearly dividends appear smaller than they really were, the Directors passed a resolution declaring the capital of the company to be trebled. It was accordingly entered in their books at £31,500, each holder of £100 stock secoming by that arrangement a proprietor to the amount of £300. Thirty years after that date a similar proceeding was adopted, and by a stroke of the post the company to the tompany are placed to represent £300. Subsequently a further subscription of 10 per cent, was raised in cash, and nominally trebled, so as to amount of £2,605. and added to the previous capital account in the company's books, which then stood at £103,500, of which, however, only £13,650 was really subscribed by the sharcholders. In the middle of the last century the company appears to have realized £6, 364 a year in net profits; which on acapital, apparently of £10,3500, is small enough for a monopoly trade, but taken as a dividend upon their real capital of £13,600, amounted to no less than 50 per company. Two years ago this valuable property changed hands—still retaining the title however of the 'Hudson's Bay Company.' The coasideration received by the old propertors being the enormous sum of one million five hundred thousand pounds sterling; of which £1,023, 569 was for landed properties in British Columbia; a claim against the United States Government under the Oregon treaty; ships, goods, pelts, and business premises in England and Canada. £350,000 was a cash balance, and the remainder, £100,-431, we may take as the outside value placed on territorial rights by both the old and the new Hudson's Bay Companies.

For these territorial rights, the Hudson's Bay Company, at the suggestion of Lord Granville, are willing to take the sum of \$300,000, together with their present stations—50,000 acres of land—and one-twentieth of the lands that may be surveyed for selttement during the next fifty years.
