Guelph Township Council. Council met on Monday, the 9th, pursuant to adjournment. James Laidlaw, Esq., Reeve, in the chair. Present Messers. Benham, Darby, Howes and Sweetram. The minutes of last meeting were read and confirmed. In compliance with a resolution passed at last meeting the Reeve reported that he had made enquiry relating to the sale of lot No. 14 in Keating's survey, the property of Mr. Wm. Steele, and was informed by Mr. Oliver, who had purchased it, that he was quite agreeable to give up all claim on said property, upon being refunded the amount he had paid. Moved by Mr. Darby, seconded by Mr. Howes, That the Reeve be authorized to settle with Mr. R. Oliver, by paying the amount paid by him for lot No. 14, Keating's survey, with interest and expenses connected therewith, said lot having been sold by mistake.—Carried. The Reeve stated that Mr. George Weltzer called on him relating to a private road leading from his property to the Waterloo road, and requesting to be allowed a portion of his statute labor. The Clerk was instructed to make out a list and forward it; also to call Mr. Fear's attention to the ditch he is making in said road division, which, as he been represented, will not only render the road dangerous, but will be diverting the water from its natural course, thereby likely to bring cases of damages with expenses against the communication from Mr. John Mickle, requesting the Council to release him from being held responsible for taxes upon the personal property (also for dog tax) assessed against George Anthony, late tonant of a portion of his property, and desiring to have the whole real property. No action taken, the rell having been made that the approaches to the crossing of the railway on the road leading from Blyth's hotel to the west end are so narrow and unguarded as to render them unsafe for teams.
