

Birds of High Degree In Calgary

Beautifully Colored Birds Are Living Here This Winter—Natives of the South.

The citizens of Calgary are usually too busy with every day affairs to notice the presence of a flock of evening grosbeaks within the city limits. These beautifully colored birds make their home in the mountains of New Mexico, but during the winter months their movements are influenced by the food supply when they occasionally wander as far east as the prairie provinces, Ontario, and on one or two occasions have been observed in the province of Quebec. Being members of the finch family they have the unusually thick beak, peculiar to seed eating birds. The plumage of the males is of

surpassing beauty and when seen among the bleak and withered fruit of the Red River maple on which they principally subsist they will be quickly recognized as wanderers from a warmer climate. Mr. Edwin Beaupre of Kingston who takes a keen interest in ornithology recognized the evening grosbeak in the C. P. R. park where they may be seen feeding in the morning. The adult males have golden yellow colored bodies, deep black tails and black and white wings. Young males and females lack these gorgeous colors being uniformly grey, with two wing bars of black and white.

THE SHAH WILL BE ENTOMBED ON FEB 2

The Day is an Especially Sacred One to His People

Teheran, Jan. 9.—The entombment of the new shah, Mohammed Ali Mirza, has been fixed for the Chader festival (the festival of the lake) which will be celebrated on Feb. 2, being the anniversary of the day upon which the prophet, standing by the side of the lake, proclaimed that Mohammed Ali Mirza was his own flesh and blood. Almost immediately after the official announcement of the death of the shah this morning, Mohammed Ali Mirza proceeded to the palace, where he was formally acknowledged as shah by the grand vizier and other princes of the royal family and by a large number of high court and government officials. Late today the body of the dead monarch was removed with imposing ceremonies to the "Great Takieh," where it will remain until the actual interment. The date of these obsequies has not yet been fixed.

Lost Money Last Year and Decides to Wind Up

Fredericton, N.B., Jan. 9.—The Fredericton Boom Co., which controls lumber booms at Fredericton, decided at its annual meeting yesterday to wind up its affairs and go out of business, the offer of \$40,000 made by a syndicate of lumbermen for the business being refused. There is a judgment of \$55,000 in favor of the People's bank of Fredericton against the company and the shareholders decided that to meet this debt they would agree to double the liability on their shares. It was declared that the company lost \$4,000 on the season's operations of 130,000,000 feet, besides other losses of other years.

JOKER OF RAREBIT ORDER, SUICIDES

Life According to Him was Huge Comedy

New York, Jan. 9.—With a note lying nearby in which he had written that "Life is a rarebit dream," the body of Albert A. Chittenden, an artist of some note, was found in his luxuriously furnished apartment on Twenty-Ninth street today. Chittenden committed suicide by inhaling gas, after careful preparation. He had been dead at least three days. Pinned on his waistcoat was the following note:

"Life is a rarebit dream. Ha, ha. Such a funny dream, but enough; I am ready to awake to something less ridiculous." The suicide left a letter addressed to C. E. Knaublauch, of Lower Broadway, who says that it was evidently the message of a man crippled mentally and physically. The letter is said to be a rambling comment on certain Wall street transactions.

TERRIBLE EXPLOSION IN PITTSBURG

Without Warning Workmen Covered With Molten Lead.

Pittsburg, Pa., Jan. 9.—As a result of an explosion of a furnace at the Eliza Furnaces of the Jones & Laughlin Steel works tonight, seven are known to be dead, seven are in a hospital with serious burns and injuries and 24 are missing.

The explosion was caused by an accumulation of gas at the base of the furnace, around which thirty-five men were working. Of all these but one man escaped injury. Without warning and with a roar like artillery, tons of molten metal were poured over the workmen and for a space of thirty feet about the furnace the metal ran, flowing at some spots to a depth of four and five feet.

Two alarms of fire were immediately sent in and all the ambulances in the city were called out. Soon the seven who were able to escape from the hot metal with their lives were taken to a hospital, but all the missing, it is thought, have been buried in the mass of steel and their bodies are consumed. While attempting to rescue some of the men, Chief Peter Snyder of the fourth fire district was thrown from a trestle thirty feet high, and was seriously injured. He was taken to a hospital.
