FIVE ARE DROWNED IN MONTANA WATERS IN TWENTY-FOUR HOURS

Man Tries In Vain to Save His Wife and Young Son in the Flathead River

Missoula, June 19.—Five deaths from drowning in rivers of northwestern Montana were reported in special dispatches to The Missoulian tonight. Mrs. Frank Scorsore and her young son, with Helme Walters, were drowned this afternoon in the Flathead river, that below the mouth of Crow creek. Frank Scorsore had a narrow escape from drowning. He made every effort to save his wife and son. Mr. and Mrs. Scorsore, with their son and Mr. Walter, were in a canoe.

Canoe Upsets
They had sailed down Crow creek to the river where they expected to board the steamer City of Dixon. Entering the river the canoe was kept downstream to a good landing place. The frail craft was kept close to the shore, but a tree, projecting into the stream, compelled them to detour. In making the turn the canoe upset in the swift current. Mr. Scorsore sought vainly to save the others, but was forced to swim ashore, completely exhausted.

Two Brothers Drown
The other accident was at Big Fork. Two brothers named Murray were drowned in the stream. The high water caused only through the heroic efforts of Joe Littlefield. The men lost their lives when a large log jammed the raft they were using in the rapids of the Big Fork river, capsized at the edge of town last evening. None of the bodies have been recovered.

GEN. WOOD, OF STATES SAYS WAR CANNOT BE AVOIDED

Declares That In Event of Hostilities States Will Need 600,000 Men

Pittsburg, Pa., June 18.—Asserting that war must come at some time and declaring that every young man should have a year's military training, Major General Leonard Wood, chief of staff of the United States army, addressed today "Our Military Policy to Preserve Peace," at the annual meeting of the Carnegie Institute of Technology here.

"I do not wish to introduce a spirit of criticism against the peace policies which are being followed by our country," said General Wood. "I am sure that you all are as anxious as I am to avoid war, but we cannot do it. Knowing that it is among us, we must be prepared to handle it as skillfully as possible."

"We know that war is coming, we know that it is a senseless waste of money and lives, but by the pressure of public events, we are forced upon us tomorrow it will be necessary for this government to call out 600,000 men immediately. For this army we would need 1,000,000 men. We have only 400,000 officers prepared to command. We would be obliged to send our troops to the front in a state of unpreparedness. The inevitable result would be the loss of our lives and property, and that would be a disaster of which we have had too much actual warfare."

OVER HIGH LEVEL BRIDGE TO EDMONTON

First Train Passed Over Yesterday Morning, and Was Welcomed in City

Edmonton, June 19.—Between seven and eight o'clock this morning three passenger trains crossed the high level bridge to the temporary depot of the C.P.R. on the north side of the river. The depot, which is a complete structure between 715 and 815 with people leaving and arriving at the depot.

The first train from Calgary which reached the north side depot at 7 a.m. and the north side depot at 7.15. The train after depositing passengers on the temporary platform pulled up towards Jasper avenue and stood in the siding.

FIVE FOX PUPS IN EDMONTON WORTH ABOUT \$1,000

The pups came in from Vancouver, where a local fur dealer bought them and shipped them to Mr. Lee. They are worth about \$1,000. The silver cross pups are two months old and the red two weeks younger.

TWO YEARS, AND LASH IN REGINA

Regina, June 19.—Two years' hard labor and 40 lashes was the sentence given by Magistrate Traut in the city police court this morning to James McNeil, once of Belfast, Ireland, and more recently of Moose Jaw, for an attempted indecent assault on a five-year-old girl yesterday. McNeil narrowly escaped lynching at the hands of a number of infuriated railway men and firemen.

A Huge Post Office
New York's new post office, a massive pile of pink granite five stories in height and two blocks long is the greatest building of its kind in the world. From the top to the bottom edge of granite is 91 feet. It cost \$5,000,000.

MAYOR TO BE BUSY ST. LOUIS TELEPHONE GIRLS STRIKE FOR HIGHER WAGE

He Has Consented to Conduct the Opening Ceremonies and Is To Be the Official Discoverer of the Fire That Is To Bring the Firemen Out

Union Leaders Say 300 Have Quit, While Company Officials Put It at 63

St. Louis, June 19.—Tests made by newspaper reporters today indicated little impairment in the service of the Southern Telephone and Telegraph and Telephone company (Bell), whose operators were called out on strike today, but the company insisted an advertisement in the afternoon papers requesting the public to keep telephone messages to a minimum.

It was impossible late today to make an accurate estimate of the number of girls who obeyed the strike order. The officials of the company said only 63 of their local employees had quit work, but the union leaders announced that 300 had struck.

The company in its afternoon advertisement announced that it had engaged a large number of experienced operators for temporary service and that conditions would be normal.

Strike Order is Circulated
The strike order was spread among the various exchanges by committees of three, who took the hour when shifts are changed as the most opportune to call out the operators. In many instances the committee found the doors barred against them and soon reports reached the police that operators were being locked in and there being no communication with the public. The strike order was, however, and investigation failed to substantiate them. The strike was orderly.

Girls Ride in Taxis
Girls who had been under training as telephone operators were escorted by the police to various exchanges to take the place of strikers, and at several places the company kept taxis in which to transport strikers from point to point.

While the company was appealing to the public through large advertisements, the strikers appealed to the public by distributing cards on all the downtown corners.

Union Issues Cards
One of these cards read:
"The Bell Telephone company refuses to pay the wages to organized labor in St. Louis, but pays money to those who strikebreakers. They discharge St. Louis girls and men because they are not strikers."
The strike does not involve the Kinloch company's lines, which were working as usual today.

AVERAGE INCREASE IN ALL DEPARTMENTS 20 PER CENT

An Increase of 200 Entries In Live Stock Department Over Entries of Last Year; Poultry Fanciers Prepare For a Big Show of Birds

Mayor Smett will be a busy man in connection with the fair, as he has consented to conduct the opening ceremonies which will be held on the afternoon of July 1, and also to be the official discoverer of the fire which is supposed to demolish the building which enters the grounds which has been secured for the purpose.

The fair is due to take place on the evening of Citizens' Day, July 3, and this will be one of the big spectacles of the fair, as it will bring out the fire department from the new hall near the fair gates, with all their motor fire apparatus, and show the spectators the spectacle of an up-to-date fire department in action.

Department Officials Coming.
Special attention will be paid to the sheepmen at Calgary exhibition and they will be two of the officials of the Dominion live stock branch here in this connection. They will occupy portions of the tent which will be set apart for the provincial department of agriculture. The live stock branch will be in charge and will be assisted by G. J. Williamson, who is the wool commissioner.

Mr. Williamson will give demonstrations of the preparation and grading of the wool, which is very important work will no doubt prove of great interest to the flock masters.

New Horse Classes.
Such a large number of entries have been received for the various horse classes at the Calgary fair that several new classes have been created. They have been conceived and necessary owing to the many horses which are coming to the fair, and which are not in the prize list.

A special novice class has been created to handle the large numbers of light and heavy horses, and in four events post-entries will be received.

Manager Richardson is very enthusiastic over the outlook for the fair and says there will be in all departments an increase of 20 per cent over those of last year.

All the lists are not made up yet, but such entries as are obtainable to show a heavy increase.

The additional interest which is being taken in the live stock industry is indicated in the very large increase in the horse classes. There is an increase over last year of about 200 in the entries at present, and in 1,100, which will be increased considerably before all the entries are tabulated.

Cattle breeders are also turning out better, there being a total of 350 entries made, which is a considerable increase over any previous record.

Poultry fanciers are preparing for a great show, and already there have been over 1,000 birds classified and counted, and this number will also be added to before the fair is complete.

There will be full compartments in the swine and sheep sections, for there are a great number of entries.

When the figures are completed for all the sections there will be very large increase, and it looks as though the fair which opens June 30, will have set many new records.

MEXICAN REBELS ARE EXECUTED; BURNED RAILROAD BRIDGE

R. F. Del Valle Off to Investigate Conditions For American Government

El Paso, Texas, June 19.—Mexican federal officials assert that strong reinforcements from Torreon, Coahuila, have entered Chihuahua state. Two strong columns led by General Muniga and General Pascual Orozco Jr. are said to be advancing north along the Mexican Central Railroad.

All railway and telegraph communication today remained out of commission below this point. Eight insurgents, caught in an attempt to burn bridges on the Mexico Northwestern Railway, were executed today by federal troops from Juarez.

To Confer With Huerta.
Tucson, Ariz., June 19.—R. F. Del Valle, Los Angeles, who carries his probe of the Mexican situation as far as the national capital, he said today upon returning here from a conference with insurgent state officials at Hermosillo, Sonora. He expects to leave today to confer with Provisional President Huerta at Mexico City.

"I shall content myself with conveying my impressions to Mr. Wilson and Mr. Bryan, who are personal friends of mine," said Del Valle. "I will do this whether or not my observations will be of any effect in bringing about peace in Mexico."

Mr. Del Valle predicts that the struggle between the state troops and federal in southern Sonora soon will take form in a decisive battle.
