Mac-Laren, Stratford; Harold Eagle, Attercliffe Station; Hon. T. Ballantyne, Stratford; John Prain, Harriston; J. S. Pearce, London; J. F. Williams, Ingersoll; J. N. The principal items of business transacted were: Making grants to the fall fairs and arranging the time and place for holding the next annual convention. The usual grant of \$100 towards prizes in the dairy department of the Western

Hodson, Guelph, superintendent of the Farmers' Institutes of the Province, was present and addressed the meeting at some length, with the view of securing the co-operation of the association in holding a dairy show in connection with the Fat Stock Show at Guelph in December, and in holding a series of joint dairy and institute meetings during the winter. He also desired that if possible the association would hold its annual conventions during the month of December. He claimed that it would be of special advantage to the institute work to have all the annual conventions of the various associations in the Province on or before the beginning of the year. Such a plan would leave the professors of the Agricultural College and the institute workers free to attend and benefit by these annual meetings, and would allow the dairy men more opportunity to assist in institute work.

It was claimed by the members of the board that if the conventions were held in December a great many cheesemakers and dairymen would not be able to attend, as the fall make of cheese is usually in the factory to be looked after, and is not shipped till the beginning of the year. The board expressed itself, however, as being willing, as far as possible, to co-operate with Mr. Hodson in his work, and arranged as early a date for their next convention as was deemed advisable under the circumstances. The other matters referred to by Mr. Hodson were left to the executive committee to deal with.




