# London Riders at Detroit.

They Win Most of the Events at  
the Gymkhana.

Stayed Over for the Fox Hunt—Messrs.  
Beck and Dennison Distinguished  
Themselves.

London riders were prominent in the  
Detroit Gymkhana on Saturday, and  
were the guests of the Detroit Riding  
Club. The Detroit Free Press says:  
"The club was materially assisted by  
members of the London Hunt Club,  
all of whom are familiar with the  
sports embraced, and who were gener-  
ally successful when they entered  
competitions."

Miss Gibbons, Miss Helen Gibbons,  
Mr. Adam Beck and Major Dennison,  
of the London Hunt Club, participated  
in the nomination race. Mr. Beck won  
easily, with Major Dennison second.  
The jumping competitions for gen-  
tlemen brought out four riders and  
six horses. Mr. Beck won with Long  
Shot, which animal showing better form  
than Lady Like, ridden by Mr. Swee-  
ney. Mr. Dyer was third, with Glad-  
stone. The others were, Mr. Beck,  
who mounted Mr. Dyer, with Lala,  
and Major Smith, of London, with  
Blanche, which mare refused.

Ladies then took charge of the  
jumpers, and went over three hurdles  
with them. Miss Maclean rode Beau-  
ty, who refused the first, and then  
went on and cleared them all with-  
out striking one. Miss Helen Gib-  
bons was second to her, with Long  
Shot, who struck the first jump, and  
Miss Gibbons was third, with Hunts-  
man, much too strong a horse for a  
lady.

In the potato race Mr. Beck and  
Major Dennison outstripped all com-  
petitors—the Detroit riders falling by  
the wayside.

In the half-mile trot London men  
were again in front. Mr. Beck, Major  
Dennison and Major Smith leading.  
Today the London visitors will en-  
joy a fox hunt of seven miles, for  
which the London hounds will be used.

ceased.
