Madrin, Sept. 29.—Father Martin, Vicar-General of the Jesuits, is believed to be the probable successor of the late Father Anderledy as general of the order. German Emigration Regulations.

Teach Manuella Concert plated on the German Emigration Regulations. Berlin, Sept. 30.—The Bundesrath has approved a bill prepared for the Reichstag establishing uniform emigration regulations throughout the empire. The bill establishes a special emigration department to be connected with the Foreign Office to give advice and information to emigrants, who will be allowed to leave their country only from German harbors. The employment of emigration agents is restricted to German shipping companies.

Took a Letter Containing \$4,500 in Checks

Took a Letter Containing \$4.500 in Checks and Used Them as Playthings.

Philadelihia, Sept. 20.—A little girl, innocent of any thought of wrong, slipped hör hand through the big slot in the village postoffice door at Darby, Pa., and took out a letter containing checks for \$4,500. This was why the valuable letter from the First National Bank of Darby to the Independence Bank of Philadelphia went aetray. Mary Andrews, 7 years of age, was the culprit. She and other children, among whom was her sister Lizzie, 11 years of age, when playing around the postoffice door on the way home from school, and while Lizzie was looking in at the window little Mary put her hand in the slot of the letter box and withdrew it with a long envelope in her grasp. Soon nearly all the children of Darby were playing bankers around the lots with the stolen checks. The bank did notfdiscover its loss for two or three days, when its officers received a letter from the Independence Bank of Philadelphia, stating that they had failed to receive the expected checks. Investigation was begun, and the checks were found scattered broadcast throughout Darby. Payment on them was stopped, and most of them, amounting to over \$3,000, were recovered. As the child was too young to realize what she had done, no legal proceedings were begun against her.
