# HURRICANE

Island of Bermuda, Sept. 14.-The storm raged the whole of Tuesday night. No lives were lost, but heavy damage was done to public and private property. The causeway was badly injured and the Government House damaged. The storm began with heavy rain, after which there was a slight lull for a few moments, with the wind southeast and the barometer slowly falling. The wind and ometer slowly falling. The wind suddenly backed to east, blowing with cyclonic gusts. From 8 p.m. till mid-night it blew with hurricane force, and was at its worst from 1 a.m. till 4 a.m. The wind blew down houses and unroofed others. Giant cedars were uprooted, ornamental fruit trees were destroyed, and wharves were washed inshore. So far no lives have been reported lost, but both ends of the island have yet to be heard from. The telephone and telegraph poles were torn down, causing a total interruption of business. There has been considerable damage at the military camp. The city hall, public gardens and hotels and several public and private dwellings were also damaged, and numerous small craft in the harbor were sunk or driven ashore. At the dockyards the damage done is very serious. On Ireland and Boaz Islands everything is more or less injured. The damage is estimated at about £100,000.
