Buller Wins Praise From the War Office.

The Unlucky Dorsets Earn the Commander's Commendation -How Allemann's Pass Was Forced-The Heights Gallantly Stormed-British Prisoners Suffer From Cold -Tons of Supplies Reaching the Boers Via

AT ALLEMANN'S NEK. The correspondents' accounts of the fighting at Allemann's Nek, if accurate, must be taken as confirmation of the reports of the extreme demoralization of the Boers. The Standard's correspondent describes the Nek as a position of immense natural strength. Hills of great height rise almost abruptly from the road, which winds round precipitous rocky slopes. The position might have been held with ease by 500 determined men against 10,000. The natural protection of the pass is continued on either side by ascending ranges of hills, cleft by sudden precipices and deep ravines. There was only one way for the column to go up. There was only one thing to do. It had to force the pass and storm the heights commanding it. This was done gallantly. When the march began in the morning it the accepted conclusion that the Boers would make a stand in the hills, but thanks to the dash and determination with which the assault was delivered, position after position was carried, and the Nek and commanding heights were in possession of the British with exceptionally small losses. It was one of the finest and most dashing engage-

ments of the Natal campaign. The same correspondent, under date of June 13, records that the Boers, numbering some thousands, succeeded in getting away with their guns. They retreated to Ermelo. The white flag is flying everywhere. The women are all in tears, ignorant of whether their husbands and brothers are dead or

#### The Canadians.

DISTINGUISHED THEMSELVES London, June 14.-The Morning Standard correspondent at Kroonstad, cabling yesterday, says that at Yester Nek the Canadians were ordered to advance toward the enemy's front, and to take cover and to hold the enemy within long-range fire. The Canadians advanced under a heavy shell fire from three guns over a dead level plain, and gained the foot of a slight ridge before the main range held by the Boers, and took cover behind a stone All the time they were pouring a steady well-aimed fusillade at the enemy, and, finding themselves flanked, the Boers left during the night.

According to the Standard's correspondent. the Canadians figured prominently in forcing Botha to evacuate his position near Pretoria. Capt. Baker, of C. Company, who has been in the hospital in South Africa, has returned to duty. TWO MISSING.

# CDECTACIE

Music, Fireworks and Military Man euvers at Carling's Heights

The Tattoo Attended by a Crowd Numbering Nearly 25,000.

Further Interesting Remarks by Col. Aylmer-Possibility of the Camp Being Removed From London.

The success that was attained by the military tattoo on the camp grounds last night was far beyond anything that was anticipated by its promoters. They had hoped that their arrangements for the control and comfort of the crowd were so comprehensive that all might be accommodated; but it was not so, because of the restrictions imposed upon the committee in charge by the lack of an adequate supply of chairs. Although 3,000 had been placed within the inclosure they were only a drop in the bucket in comparison with those that would undoubtedly have been used if obtainable. That there should have been this deficiency in supply was unfortunate, not so much on account of any discomfort that may have arisen, because that was soon forgotten in the pleasure derived from the entertainment, but it was particularly aggravating to the good ladies who had boomed the tattoo so vigorously, to see go to waste such a splendid opportunity to enrich their coffers of charity.

As early as 7 o'clock the people

were assembling on the grounds, and the number was being added to continuously. As the evening passed by the streets leading to the Heights were dark with crowds, and on the roads, vehicles of all kinds and bicycles in hundreds mingled and raced in order to arrive first. For a full halfhour before the gates of the enclosure were opened there were thousands awaiting admission, and when this was gained there was an eager rush for seats. All that were supplied were occupied almost immediately. others streamed into the grounds. The street car service was utterly unable to carry all the pasengers who sought conveyance, although the Central avenue and Oxford street lines were run to their full capacity. On the hill the immense inclosure was soon surround ed, and without those who were standing many deep at the railings, were thousands who were unable to get nearer. There were probably 25,000

people there. The programme was carried out with a precision and rapidity that was especially delightful to those who were standing and who might otherwise have been wearied. For this reason the officers who conducted it so skillfully deserve credit. All of the bands in camp, several full regiments and companies, the brigades' stretcher-bearers, the Collegiate Institute Cadets and the veterans of '66 and '85 assisted. The entertainment provided by them was continued without intermission, and was varied by a beautiful display of fireworks. The spectacle that was made by the red and dark coats of the soldiers, arranged in effective tableau,

"Good wages are being paid," and he added, "I suppose that's because of the government we now have." Continuing, he said: When a man can get \$1 50 a day working on a farm, you can hardly expect him to come here for 50 cents a

Col. Aylmer is not in favor of the existing canteen law, although as a soldier he favors its observance when in orders. He considers that there is a tendency to cause drinking and row-dyism in the city when the men are

deprived of beer.
While talking of rifle ranges, Col. Aylmer hinted at some very important changes that are in contemplation in the militia department. This district, he said, was without a rifle range that was safe. Consequently the men were forced to resort to the Morris tube practice. This is good, but it is not rifle practice. "I believe that the day is coming," he said, "when the camp will have to be removed from London. Another change that will probably be accomplished in the more immediate future was that the cavalry would probably be massed at Deseronto, so that they might be trained in conjunction with the artillery.
